Interactive Multimedia as Information Media Parasitic Infection with Multimedia Development Life Cycle Method

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Abstract – This study focused on the problem of lack of interactive multimedia-based educational information media that is interesting as a provider of information about parasitic infections in humans. This parasitic infection is very dangerous, especially for children who still lack knowledge about it. The aim of this research is to provide educational information media to the wider community, especially at the Seberang Padang Health Center, about parasitic infections in a way that is as interesting as possible and easy to use. Interactive multimedia is a solution to this problem. This research uses the Multimedia Development Life Cycle Method as a guide in building interactive multimedia with the stages of Concept, Design, Material Collecting, Assembly, Testing and Distribution. The results of the alpha test showed that all features of this interactive multimedia can function properly. A beta test was conducted on 30 respondents from the public who accompanied patients to the Seberang Padang Health Center. As a result, this interactive multimedia received a rating of 4.54 out of 5. Therefore, this interactive multimedia is very good and suitable for use as an educational medium for information about parasitic infections. With this interactive multimedia-based educational information media, it is hoped that the wider community can better understand and be aware of parasitic infections and preventive measures that can be taken to avoid these infections.

I. INTRODUCTION

The problem discussed is that there is still a lack of interactive multimedia-based educational information media that is interesting as a provider of information about parasitic infections in humans. This parasitic infection is very dangerous, especially for children who still lack knowledge about it. Many dangers are posed by parasite infection because it can cause various diseases in humans. Some types of parasites that often attack humans are worms, fleas, mites, and flies. Here are some dangers of parasitic infections to watch out for:

- 1. Indigestion: Some parasites can invade the human digestive system, such as tapeworms and hookworms. This infection can cause diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, and abdominal pain.
- 2. Nervous system disorders: Parasitic infections such as *toxoplasma gondii* can cause disorders of the human nervous system. Symptoms include headaches, convulsions, and impaired coordination.
- 3. Anemia: Parasitic infections such as hookworms can cause anemia in humans. This happens because the parasite feeds on human blood.
- 4. Skin diseases: Some parasites such as scabies mites and head lice can cause skin diseases in humans. Symptoms that appear include itching, rashes, and wounds on the skin.

Respiratory system disorders: Parasitic infections such as *fasciolopsis buski* can cause disorders of the human respiratory system. Symptoms that appear include shortness of breath and coughing.

The development of information technology has provided many benefits to everyone. The use of information technology can facilitate many jobs, and continues to emerge various innovations in various fields such as online learning, interactive [1]games, interactive tutorials, [2]simulations, interactive product catalogs, interactive [3] animated videos [4] [5], [6]interactive 3d presentations and [7] health education [8]. One form of technological development is an interactive multimediabased system, which can be used as a medium of educational information as in this study which focused on parasitic infections in humans.

Interactive multimedia is one way to display information to be very interesting. There are still many systems that do not use interactive multimedia as a tool to display information because its manufacture takes time and also costs. Previous research on interactive multimedia, including by Wulandari in 2022 with the resultsof the use of interactive multimedia-based UNO card media, is feasible to be used to help improve early childhood cognitive abilities in recognizing and counting numbers[9]. Further research by Munawaroh, et al in 2022 with the results of interactive multimedia use has a significant influence on regional language learning in children. Interactive multimedia has an appeal that can grab



children's attention and is proven to improve their understanding associated with regional language learning at an early age[10]. Furthermore, by Wirantini, et al in 2022 with the results that interactive multimedia-based learning media cycle topics are feasible to use, interactive multimedia-based learning can help students in learning, especially in science material on water cycle topics.[11] Furthermore, by Yuliana, et al in 2022 with the results of interactive multimedia used as an addition to learning, so that children can access material anytime and anywhere without time and space restrictions. This product has been tested by experts and students, and is considered suitable for use as an effective learning media, as [12] well as many other studies such as h utan ebation animation[13], ornamental fish disease information [14] and plant disease information[15]. The application of interactive multimedia in this study is to provide information to the public about parasitic infections that can attack humans.

If there is no interesting information media to present this information, then most people, especially children, will feel less interested in reading it, even though this information is very important, knowledge regarding parasite information is still inadequate. This is caused by a lack of research on parasites, especially parasites that attack humans [16]. In developing interactive multimedia-based information media, there are several methods that can be used, such as the Rapid prototyping method, User-centered design, Agile development, Storyboarding, Object, Gamification and many other methods. In this research, the Multimedia Development Life Cycle method was used.


The MDLC method is a multimedia development consisting of six stages, namely the stages of *concept*, design, material *collecting*, *assembly*, *testing*, and *distribution* [17]. This method was chosen because it has complete stages in the development of an interactive multimedia system. This can be seen in the many multimedia-based application developments that use it, such as virtual reality as a medium for campus introduction by Citra, et al in 2022, then by Fatimah, et al in 2022 as a method for [18]learning jaipong dance.[19]

The purpose of this study is to create a medium of educational information to the wider public about parasitic infections. Through this media, it is hoped that the public can obtain information that is as interesting as possible and easy to use about the types of parasites, symptoms that appear, and how to prevent and treat appropriately. With sufficient knowledge, it is hoped that people can take better preventive measures and reduce the risk of parasitic infections.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY 2.1 Research Stages

In a study, a research method is a series of procedures that must be carried out. The goal is that the author can design the research appropriately and not deviate from the subject matter. In addition, the systematization of steps in research also aims to be easily understood and can be used as a clear guideline in solving existing problems. In this study, the author used the Multimedia Development Life Cycle (MDLC) method depicted in Figure 1. This method was chosen because it

has clear and systematic stages in designing and developing multimedia. .



There are six stages to the MDLC method, from Figure 1. can be described the process of MDLC, which is as follows:

1. Concept Stage

This stage is the purpose of making the system and who is the user of the designed system and also analyzing the needs of the system.

2. Design

The *design* stage is the stage of making program specifications such as material requirements or materials for the program, program display and program architecture. The design phase includes program structure, UML design and program design.

3. Material Collecting

The stage of collecting the materials to be used first. Than the material that has been collected will be continued at the next stage, namely *assembly*.

4. Assembly

The *assembly* stage is the stage of making all multimedia materials. Program creation is based on the design stage, program structure, UML design and program design.

5. Testing

This stage is carried out after completing the *manufacturing* stage (assembly). This stage is carried out by testing by the maker (alpha testing) in *black box* testing and *beta testing*.

6. Distribution

At this stage of distribution, the development team had to determine the right place to distribute interactive multimedia about parasitic infections. Some places that may be chosen include websites, mobile applications, or physical storage media such as CDs or flash drives. The selection of distribution sites must be adjusted to the target users and the purpose of the interactive multimedia. In addition, the development team must



also ensure that the interactive multimedia can be accessed easily and has good quality in order to provide optimal benefits for users.

2.1 Research Supporting Theories

There are several theories that will support this research process that are useful for the basis of research related to existing theories. The theory is as follows:

1. Multimedia

Multimedia is one of the learning media that combines several media elements presented in computer media. Interactive multimedia is a solution in making it easier for students to learn material compared to monotonous textbooks/*e-books*. In research Farida & Rahayu (2017) showed a significant difference in learning outcomes in the use of interactive multimedia rather than using textbooks [20]. The use of multimedia in learning will be able to produce more interesting learning and can increase students' understanding of the material provided[21]

2. Interactive Multimedia

Interactive Multimedia is a tool equipped with a controller that can be used by users to choose something expected, such as a gaming system and others. Interactive multimedia is a collection of several media such as technology, images, audio, *video*, and animation that are interactive in nature that are used to convey information[22]. Multimedia in learning allows everyone to process information visually and verbally, and utilize the brain's potential in learning. Making interactive multimedia can use a variety of systems or *software*[23].

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The results that can be obtained from the implementation of the MDLC method in building a Parasitic Infection information system based on interactive multimedia packaged in the form of interactive media in the form of educational *videos* include several menu options that support the system. Details of the stages that have been carried out in this study are as follows:

1. Concept

At this stage, researchers design the flow concept of a system that is built concisely and easily understood, so that this system can help educate about Parasitic Infections to the wider community, especially for children more easily. The concept flow built on this Parasitic Infection education system is as follows:

a. Design

 - The following is the program structure of the parasitic infection interactive multimedia system:




Fig 3. Structure of Parasitic Infection Interactive Multimedia System





Fig 4. Use Case Interactive Multimedia Diagram




Fig 5. Interactive Multimedia Sequence Diagram




Fig 6. Interactive Multimedia Activity Diagram

The Activity Diagram will illustrate system activities not what actors do, so activities that can be performed by the system. In the interactive multimedia that will be built there are six activities that can be done by users, from displaying the main page, selecting material, choosing the type of material, displaying material in the form of text or video and returning to the main menu.

3. Design Program

Program design is one of the important things in building an interactive multimedia, from this design will be a guide to how the appearance and layout of menus and content will be displayed on interactive multimedia to be built. Here is the program design:

The initial screen will be designed with five buttons consisting of profiles and instructions on the upper left side, *mute* and exit buttons on the upper right side, start button at the bottom. 


Fig 8. Profile Display Design &; How-To Page





Fig 9. Menu Page Design Select Parasite Information Type &; Material Selection Page

On the design of the page the material appears, the title of the type of parasite information selected will be given, then in the middle will be given an option button in the form of text or video material, later the system will display material based on the choice of the user. At the top right will be given three additional buttons in the form of home, instructions and mute. The next design is a page of material text.

On the material text page, later the type of

On the *video* material page, later the selected type of parasite information will be displayed, then under the title will be given material in the form of *a Video* that can be played by users and on the top right isis of the page there are three buttons, namely home, instructions and mute.

4. Material Collecting

At this stage, researchers will collect mater materials and assets to make interactive multimedia. At this stage the author uses adobe animate and adobe illustrator.

The collection process using Adobe Illustrator by designing and creating the necessary assets according to the function of each asset for interactive multimedia Parasitic Infection. The next collection of assets using Adobe Animate.

This process combines assets that have been created in Adobe Illustrator. At this stage, the process of selecting animations, transitions, *placing frames*, and so on is also carried out so that when used by interactive multimedia users it can run as attractive as possible.

5. Assembly

At this stage, researchers build interactive multimedia as interesting as possible that can meet information to users about Parasitic Infections, along with the results of the *assembly* process:




Fig 15. Display of Text Material

b) Beta Testing

In beta testing, it will involve as many as 30 respondents or users to see the feasibility of interactive multimedia built. There are 14 assessment indicators and five values, namely: 1 = very not good, 2 = not good, 3 = not good, 4 = good enough , 5 = very good. For example, with the indicator "The material presented in interactive learning media is in accordance with the learning objectives"





Fig 17. Measurement of Indicator 1 In Figure 17. Showing measurements of assessment indicator 1 with results, 13 respondents gave very good marks, 15 respondents gave quite good marks, 2 respondents gave poor grades, 0 respondents gave bad and very bad grades. So if calculated by rating, it is as follows:

From the results obtained in Figure 18 is 4.54 out of a scale of 5, so with this value interactive multimedia that is built is very feasible to be used as a medium of information about Parasitic Infections.

7. Distribution

The distribution process through websites and playstores, this is becauseat present, the most appropriate interactive multimedia distribution place for the general public is through websites and mobile applications. This is because the use of the internet is increasingly widespread and easily accessible to the public. In addition, interactive multimedia published through websites and mobile applications can be accessed anytime and anywhere by users.

IV. CONCLUSION

Interactive multimedia on parasitic infections is an effective educational information medium for improving public knowledge of parasitic infections. This interactive multimedia can be used by various stakeholders, such as health centers, hospitals, and public health organizations. It can be used to educate the public about parasitic infections, thus preventing the spread of the disease. This multimedia was developed using the MDLC method, which consists of six phases. Beta testing of 30 community respondents who accompanied patients for treatment at the Seberang Padang Health Center resulted in a highly positive evaluation. The interactive multimedia was rated as engaging and interactive, containing accurate and up-to-date information, and being easily accessible.

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Abstract – The speed of technological development has made it possible for all people to be connected to one another. The creation of web-based information systems that help in all areas, including government, health, and education, is one of the forces behind the development of technology. With these technological advancements, websites are susceptible to cybercrimes that could end in the theft of crucial data. Top 10 Web Application Security Risks is the most effective prevention process for decrease company information leaks. On the website tangerangkota.go.id, the researcher will conduct a test using the Top 10 Web Application Security Risks consist of Broken Access Control, Cryptographic Failures, Injection, Insecure Design, Security Misconfiguration, Vulnerable and Outdated Components, Identification and Authentication Failures, Software and Data Integrity Failures, Security Logging and Monitoring Failures, Server-Side Request Forgery. The penetration testing results found on the Tangerang City website which are 4 injections, 2 broken access controls, 1 security misconfiguration.

I. INTRODUCTION

The advancement of information technology (IT), particularly the internet and information systems or applications that are web-based, has significantly altered human life. The security of users must be carried out in conjunction with this rapid technological advancement.

Internet users who browse the web need to be shielded. As a result, users should consider security as an important indicator. Due to the importance for protection, every field possesses distinct levels of security. Security in the public field (domain *.go.id) is distinct from those found in educational institutions (domain *.sch.id or.ac.id). There were 976.429.996 cyberattacks in 2022, with malware activities, web defacement, data breaches, human-operated ransomware, phishing, and advanced persistent threats continuing to cause the majority of traffic anomalies [1]. According to the report, the government agency sector was attacked by about 68% of respondents, followed by e-commerce by 17%, financial institutions by 11%, social media by 3%, and cryptocurrencies by 1%.

Tangerang in the province of Banten uses a web-based information system (with the domain https://tangerangkota.go.id/) to disseminate information about official activities that is beneficial to residents in Tangerang general and residents in particular. Unfortunately, it cannot be denied that defacement attacks from outside sources led to user information being exposed within the Tangerang government website. One of the world's defacement archives, www.zone-h.org, allows users to view the attack's history. An archive website called Zone-H maintains a list of websites that have been affected.

Zone-h data indicates that cyberattacks caused by web defacement have occurred against the Tangerang website. Despite the fact that the attack took place in 2016, it may still occur due to a fresh revealing (vulnerability) that the manager of the Tangerang website has not yet discovered

and may be exploited again.

The aims of this study is to analyze web security testing with the domain tangerangkota.go.id from attacks from irresponsible outsiders that can damage Tangerang City, analyze applications under development for web security testing, implement a system tool for testing security gaps in web applications.

Muhammad Subagja is testing the application security system using Zero Entry Hacking. The results are that each web he tests has 41 vulnerabilities, and the average CVSS is medium level [2]. Ahmad Fikri Zulfi found an XSS gap on two subdomains of Jember University that can be exploited to change the web's appearance or insert links to enter other websites. The vulnerability cannot be exploited further [3]. The definition of vulnerability is a weak point where a system is vulnerable to attack [4]. Vulnerability is a weakness that threatens an asset's integrity, confidentiality, and availability [5].

Afif Zirwan uses Acunetix WVS tools and information system security principles to test the Institute of Technology Padang website, and have six vulnerabilities with the CVSS are medium and high levels [6]. Common Vulnerability Scoring System (CVSS) is an open framework used to communicate the characteristics and impact of an application vulnerability. A decrease in the vulnerability score after improvement indicates that the security evaluation carried out has been able to reduce the risks that previously existed, and it can be said that the website has become relatively safe [7].

Harry and M. Akbar analysis of binadarma.ac.id vulnerability in the outdated version application using SQL Injection attacks and found several vulnerabilities due to the outdated application [8].

Mira and Michael do security analysis using vulnerability assessment principles and NMAP to check for denial of service attacks, find XSS vulnerabilities in PHP files, and find vulnerabilities to SQL Injection attacks [9]. Nmap or Network Mapper is an open-source

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network security exploration and auditing tool [10]. Nmap is an application used to scan Mikrotik routers to identify existing vulnerabilities [11]. Nmap is a tool used to determine the computer's services through port scanning [12].

Feri, Harjono, and Agung analyzed security gaps using the open vulnerability assessment system and Acunetix web method to compare the result of the two tools and the results they found weaknesses in 9 data on OpenVAS with the scanning time of 60 minutes. In contrast, Acunetix WVS found weaknesses in 166 data with scanning times of 954 minutes [13].

Vulnerability Assessment (VA) is a process carried out on a website to define, identify and classify possible security gaps in computer networks or communication infrastructure [14]. Vulnerability Assessment is a step to detect, identify and study a computer system's or network infrastructure's weaknesses [15].

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

The steps taken in testing the security system can be seen in Figure. 1.

Based on the standards issued by the OWASP Framework, there are ten steps that can be taken to assess and test the security of a website:

1. Broken Access Control

These vulnerabilities allow attackers to exploit these weaknesses to access unauthorized data or functions.

2. Cryptographic Failures

This vulnerability arises due to the improper use of cryptographic technology in web applications, resulting in confidential data being accessible to attackers.

- 3. Injection This vulnerability is due to inadequate input methods in web applications, allowing attackers to insert malicious codes into systems that use inputs such as forms, URL parameters, or comment fields.
- 4. Insecure Design

This vulnerability arises when the manager neglects the proper design of the security system in the web application, such as not creating a One Time Password (OTP) or authentication feature on the login page. This allows attackers to access sensitive data and even steal user information.

 Security Misconfiguration This vulnerability occurs when unused features remain enabled or installed, the security system is not updated to the latest version, and default passwords are used. This allows attackers to perform DDOS attacks or brute force attacks and obtain sensitive data, such as user information.

- 6. Vulnerable and Outdated Components This vulnerability occurs in web applications that do not use the latest components or libraries and have vulnerabilities that can be exploited.
- 7. Identification and Authentication Failures This vulnerability occurs in web applications when attackers have a list of valid usernames and passwords, or when weak default passwords such as admin/admin are used.
- 8. Software and Data Integrity Failures This vulnerability occurs in web applications when attackers have a high probability of uploading updates to the system that they distribute, which can be downloaded or run by all installations.
- 9. Security Logging and Monitoring Failures This vulnerability occurs in web applications when managers ignore the results contained in logs, such as login failures, transaction failures, and unclear error warnings. This allows attackers to exploit this to perform various injections into the security system.
- 10. Server-Side Request Forgery

This vulnerability occurs in web applications that allow attackers to manipulate HTTP requests made on the server side. This allows attackers to connect to the internal network or internet connection to the server to steal important data.

Black box testing is utilized during the process of penetration testing. The research process commences with planning and review, during which the object of research is selected and pertinent data is gathered. Subsequently, the scanning of the research object is carried out. Once exploitable information results are obtained from the scan results, the next step involves the use of tools or manual exploitation to exploit the gap information. For the purpose of penetration testing, researchers utilize a set of nine tools, which include NMAP, ZAP, SQLmap, BurpSuite, Wappalyzer, The Harvester, WHOIS, and CMD.

As showed in Table 1, the research object's scope is outlined, with the focus being on the production area that is currently utilized by the user. The methodology adopted by the researchers is black box testing. This approach signifies that the researchers undertake penetration testing without any prior knowledge of the research object.




Figure 2 provides a detailed explanation of the steps executed by the researcher. There are several steps such as reconnaissance, scanning, exploitation, maintaining access, also analysis and reporting. In this context, reconnaissance serves to gather information about the domain, which will be highly beneficial for the scanning process. The results obtained from the reconnaissance process are as follows:

As showed in Table 2, the subsequent step involves scanning, which serves to identify bug information associated with the domain. WHOIS is also an exceptional method to identify the domain owner. However, they also possess their own applications to search for information in the WHOIS database. This implies that any information an individual seeks will be presented in detail there [16]. The Harvester functions as a comprehensive information-gathering



tool that is utilized by both ethical and non-ethical hackers to scrape emails, subdomains, hosts, employee names, open ports, and banners from various public sources, such as popular search engines [17]. The results obtained from the scanning process are as follows:

As showed in Table 3, after obtaining information about the vulnerability contained in the domain, exploitation can be carried out based on the results of the scanning. Nmap is used to scan Mikrotik routers to identify existing vulnerabilities [18]. OWASP-ZAP is a vulnerability scanner application that is freely available (open source) and has been developed by the OWASP organization. It is extremely useful in assisting with the discovery of bug information [19]. The purpose of exploitation here is to verify whether the detected bug truly resides within the website and to identify any other potential bugs that have not yet been confirmed. The outcomes of the exploitation process are as follows:

As showed in Table 4, following the exploitation, it was found that there were several bugs in the Tangerang City subdomain. SQLMap is an open-source application or tool included in Kali Linux. This application is used to detect and exploit vulnerabilities in web applications. Researchers use this application during the exploitation phase [20]. The researchers then carried out maintaining access, which serves to re-exploit to reconfirm whether the bug has been fixed or remains unfixed. The results from the maintaining access process are as follows:

The researchers categorized the vulnerabilities found according to the OWASP Top 10 Web Security Risks Framework and conducted a security vulnerability assessment using the Common Vulnerability Scoring System (CVSS). 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Sentiment Analysis of 2024 Presidential Candidates Election Using SVM Algorithm

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Abstract – Elections for presidential candidates are held every 5 years with various candidates, especially on Twitter, arguments about political matters often occur that many Twitter users participate in discussions about the election for presidential candidate. Therefore, this study focuses on sentiment analysis to infer user responses to the presidential election and validate it by looking for a correlation between electability survey results and Twitter sentiment data using Pearson Correlation. In sentiment analysis model, the 10-Fold Cross Validation method is used to find the best model from a dataset with a division of training data and test data with 90:10 split. Then the alphabetic data will be converted into numeric data using the TF-IDF weighting method. To validate the best model, Confusion Matrix is used to get the best f1-score. The model is using Support vector machine algorithm with the Gaussian RBF (Radial Basis Function) kernel. The results of the analysis are compared with the results of the news portal electability survey which contains the 3 candidates using Pearson Correlation. This study produces the best fold for each data on each presidential candidate with the f1-score to find the best model for each fold. In the Peason Correlation result, the higher positive sentiment of each presidential candidate, the higher electability survey data. For further research, research can be discuss about hyper tuning parameters and using other kernels on Support vector machine algorithm.



I. INTRODUCTION

Elections occur every 5 years with the number of voters increasing each period, with an increase of 28.90% from 2004 to 2019 [1]. Social media such as Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, YouTube have become part of human life, it is proven that most interactions can be done with social media, until it becomes self-identity to the general public [2]. On social media, especially Twitter, there is a lot of dissemination of information, entertainment, and political opinion. This is not spared from the election which is a political activity that will be held in 2024, referred to as a democratic party, this is certainly a lot of discussion on social media. One way to convey opinions and through social media is to use certain hashtags in tweets posted on Twitter. Twitter itself is used because of the ease in replying to tweets with likes, comments and even replies, so that topics that are currently being discussed can be easily spread [3]. Therefore, further analysis is needed to see how much Twitter users agree and disagree with the 2024 presidential election, then data will be obtained from Twitter user tweets related to this topic, namely the 2024 general election. Sentiment analysis or Opinion Mining is a study that learn about opinions, sentiments, evaluations, behavior and emotions towards an entity [2], [3]. Sentiment analysis is used to find out which tweets are posted containing positive, negative or neutral words [4]. In this study, the Support vector machine (SVM) method will be used, which is one of the classification methods in machine learning (supervised learning) that predicts classes based on patterns from training results. Classification is done by creating a hyperplane between positive and negative classes [2]. The results of this study are the sentiments of Twitter users towards the presidential election in 2024.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

This research consists of 6 processes in outline, namely data collection, preprocessing, Term Frequency-Inverse Document Frequency weighting, Support Vector Machine training using 10-Fold Cross Validation, Choosing the best fold to be used as a model, and testing as shown below.





A. Collection Data

The first stage of this research is to scrape data sourced from Twitter with the keyword "(Name of Candidate) President" to narrow down the context of a Twitter user's Tweet. The data collection process is carried out with the help of the snscrape library by python. Data was collected from 1 January 2023 to 31 March 2023. This scraping process resulted in a total of 18,267 data with 7,810 data that were duplicate and irrelevant to the theme "2024 Presidential Candidate Election" resulting in a total of 10,457 clean data from 3 presidential candidates.

B. Preprocessing

The pre-processing stage functions to clean and transform data so that it can be processed by the system easily and accurately. Several stages of pre-processing in this study include:

a. Lowercasing

Lowercasing is a step to change all letters to lowercase so that the word being processed becomes the same form. Table 1 shows an example of the lowercasing process from some of Anies Baswedan's tweets:

C. TF-IDF

TF-IDF weighting is a method of assessing the weight of each word in a document, TF-IDF is a strong feature weighting method that measures the frequency and distribution of words to determine their weight. TF-IDF consists of TF (Term Frequency), which is the frequency of occurrence of words in documents and IDF (Inverse Document Frequency), which is the opposite of the frequency of documents, the TF-IDF value can be obtained by using the following equation:

TF-IDF functions to convert data into numerical form so that the features that have been processed can be loaded into the equation. So this method was chosen to extract the Twitter data.

D. Support Vector Machine




Fig 2. Hyperplane Support Vector Machine Example

The algorithm chosen is the Support vector machine because the Support vector machine is a text mining algorithm that has high accuracy [8]. As seen in this journal, the Support vector machine algorithm has higher accuracy, precision, and recall compared to the Naïve Bayes algorithm, then for journal [9] it is known that the accuracy, precision, and recall of the Support vector machine algorithm has higher accuracy than the K -Nearest Neighbor (K-NN) algorithm and Naïve Bayes. Support Vector Mahine was created by Boser, Guyon, and Vapnik [10] which is a classification method for finding the best hyperplane to separate 2 classes [11]. This algorithm will produce a hyperplane that separates a plane into 2 parts in each class which can be seen in figure 2.

To use the Support vector machine algorithm, it is necessary to find the best \vec{w} to separate each class. Normally with data that is not spread out, the hyperplane is either linear or polynomial. But if it comes to the author's case, the data distribution is very wide and the feature dimensions are unlimited, then it is necessary to use a kernel trick, the implementation that the writer has done to overcome this problem is to use a Gaussian RBF (Radial Basis Function) which is able to overcome the problem above.

E. 10-Fold Cross Validation

K-Fold Cross Validation is a form of testing that serves to assess the performance of the algorithm by dividing the sample data randomly and then dividing the data as much as the K value of the total fold. Furthermore, one of the K groups will be used as data testing and the rest of the group will be used as training data [12].

After the SVM machine is trained, the best model is obtained by finding the best f1-score value from the SVM model, 10-Fold Cross Validation method divides a dataset into 10 parts with a data ratio 10:90.

Next, it will be seen from the 10 data divisions, which division has the best f1-score to take the model from the fold

F. Testing

The Confusion Matrix is a table for evaluating classification models, the fl-score value is the value used to determine the best model [13]. So I apply evaluation to research using the Confusion Matrix method. The application of the Confusion Matrix can be seen in the following table:

G. Electability Correlation

Pearson Correlation is a method that aims to find a linear relationship between 2 or more variables. The results of the Pearson Correlation are correlation coefficients ranging from numbers 0 to 1 which apply to negative numbers [10]. The Pearson Product Moment Correlation is shown in equation as follows:

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The implementation of the SVM algorithm is carried out exactly as previously attached, the development of the SVM system begins with the data cleaning stage, then transforms the data into numeric form, then conducts model training by dividing the data 10:90 using the 10-Fold Cross Validation method, and testing the best model by taking f1score value with the Confusion Matrix method. The best fold is determined based on the f1-score when the False Negative (FN) and False Positive (FP) data are not very close [14]. Also, to find the F1-score value in models with more than 2 labels, I use the macro f1, where the value taken is the average of the f1-score values for all classes, the authors use the macro value because the values will be more even for datasets that are not balanced [15].

Next the results are obtained of the training process by finding the model with the best fold, followed by an analysis of the linkages of the predicted model results using the Pearson Moment Product Correlation. The test results of the 3 presidential candidates are shown in the following table:

It can be concluded that there is a relationship between sentiment and news portal electability surveys, from the 3 presidential candidates. The result obtained by the correlation has a strong unidirectional relationship for candidate Anies Baswedan and Prabowo Subianto it means that the higher the positive sentiment, the higher the electability of the candidate. While in cadidate Ganjar Pranowo has a strong non-unidiractional relationship it means that that the lower the positive sentiment, the higher the electability of the candidate.

IV. CONCLUSION

Based on the results of the research that has been done, it can be concluded that the implementation of the Sentiment Analysis Engine with the Support Vector Machine algorithm using the Gaussian RBF kernel found the best fold for each presidential candidate, namely the 8th fold with an f1-score of 0.66 for Anies Baswedan's candidate with a total 2,554 training data and 283 testing data, the 5th fold with an f1-score of 0.72 for the Ganjar Pranowo candidate with a total of 3,330 training data and 370 testing data, and the 4th fold with an f1-score of 0.78 for the Prabowo Subianto candidate with a total of 3487 training data and 387 testing data.

Also, the correlation between the electability survey and the results of the positive sentiment analysis of presidential candidate Anies Baswedan is 0.991 and the negative sentiment is -0.991. So that the conclusion obtained by the correlation has a strong relationship in the same direction. Then for the correlation between the electability survey and the results of the analysis of positive sentiment for presidential candidate Ganjar Pranowo is -0.789 and negative sentiment is 0.789. So that the conclusion obtained by the correlation has a strong relationship in the different direction. Furthermore, the correlation between the electability survey and the results of positive sentiment analysis for presidential candidate Prabowo Subianto is 0.801 and negative sentiment is - 0.801. So that the conclusion obtained by the correlation has a strong relationship in the same direction. It can be concluded that there is a link between sentiment and news portal electability surveys.

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DevOps, Continuous Integration and Continuous Deployment Methods for Software Deployment Automation

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Abstract - In the fast-paced landscape of software development, the need for efficient, reliable, and rapid deployment processes has become paramount. Manual deployment processes often lead to inefficiencies, errors, and delays, impacting the overall agility and reliability of software delivery. DevOps, as a cultural and collaborative approach, plays a central role in orchestrating the synergy between development and operations teams, fostering a shared responsibility for the entire software delivery lifecycle. Continuous Integration is a fundamental DevOps practice that involves regularly integrating code changes into a shared repository, triggering automated builds and tests. Continuous Deployment complements Continuous Integration by automating the release and deployment of validated code changes into production environments. The purpose of this research is to create a software deployment automation system to make it easier and reliable for organizations to deploy software. In conclusion, the results of this research show that by adopting DevOps, Continuous Integration, and Continuous Deployment, organizations can achieve enhanced collaboration, shortened release cycles, increased deployment frequency, consistent deployment, and improved overall software quality.

I. INTRODUCTION

PT EOA Teknologi Internasional with the branding name EOA Tech is an entity of the EOA Group whose business is mostly as a gold producer with the gold brand issued being EOA Gold. EOA itself is an abbreviation of Emas Optimasi Abadi. PT EOA Teknologi Internasional was founded in July 2020 as a software development company engaged in software development or Independent Software Vendor (ISV). PT EOA Teknologi Internasional has been heavily involved in helping clients solve problems with software creation solutions and providing services for hosting these applications on the company's servers. For cloud service providers, companies use services from Alibaba Cloud.

With the increasingly rapid development of software development and business demands that require feature releases and software improvements to be carried out quickly accompanied by increasing frequency, consistent and automated methods for software integration and deployment are needed to minimize human error. To support this, at the organizational level, the Product Development and Operation divisions at PT EOA Teknologi Internasional are required to work together and be able to coordinate and collaborate effectively. However, work bottlenecks often occur, communication problems and a lack of synergy between the Product Development and Operations divisions which cause feature releases and software improvements to be hampered and take longer. There are other problems during deployment, namely inconsistent deployment results between the development environment, staging environment and production environments, in the development environment all features work well and have been checked by Quality Assurance, but when deployed to the production environment the results of testing in the development environment which show all features are running well are often different when deployed in the production environment, there are several features that do not work well in the production environment, this causes inconsistencies in software deployment. Another problem that causes delays in software release or deployment is that making changes to deployed software will often require both testing and planning, as well as coordination between the different involved departments [1], the deployment process carried out by the Operations division is required to be processed by the relevant team manually, it is indeed a time consuming task to develop, assure quality of and it is not desirable to add even more costly overhead to this process [2]. Apart from that, there are cases where the software deployment process must be carried out at night so it will not cause disturbance of applications that are running and used by users during the day or during working hours. Because software deployment requires intervention from the Operations division, the Product Development division often had difficulties when



deploying software at night due to the availability of the Operations division.

DevOps combines a number of approaches that bring together developers and operations staff to create software and services rapidly, reliably, and of higher quality [3]. Based on this background, the research objective is to apply DevOps, Continuous Integration and Continuous Deployment methods to automate software deployment, make it easier for companies to deploy software, avoid work bottlenecks between the Product Development and Operations divisions and minimize human error.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

2.1. Software Development Life Cycle (SDLC)

The systems development life cycle (SDLC) is a methodology for designing, building, developing and maintaining information and process systems [4]

By applying existing SDLC rules, you can provide an understanding of how an Information System (IS) can support business needs, design and build a system according to user needs [5]. The SDLC project is a directive project, namely organized and planned. SDLC project standards require release phases and in each phase there will be a build and deploy process. The deploy stage indicates that code development is complete. Then the code will be built and deployed in the Testing environment. If a bug appears in the Testing environment, the code must be fixed and then rebuilt and used in the Pre-production or Production environment.

Agile methodologies are the standard practices modern-day industries, Agile software for development has a big focus on collaboration and the self-organizing team [6]. Topics that are the center of attention of Agile include its ability to reduce costs, increase speed and quality, and provide motivation to empower employees to support the development and success of a company. Scrum is the most popular of the Agile frameworks [7]. In the Scrum framework there are Sprints and teams that will work in them. After the Sprint is complete, the Demo is complete and the Definition of Done (DoD) is met according to the user story, then each team will integrate their code and build for use in a staging or test environment. Configuration management tools will be used to integrate the code. This is where the real problem arises. Fixing this issue will take a lot of time and cause the release time to be off schedule. Problems in the build and deploy phases are very common and occur frequently in Agile work environments. This also happens in application development at PT EOA Teknologi Internasional. DevOps is expected to be a solution to this.





2.2. DevOps

DevOps (development and operations) is a conceptual study of the development and delivery of software to infrastructure by taking a collaborative and integrative approach between developers (Dev) and software operations (Ops) [8]. DevOps is an organizational approach with the aim of creating collaboration, interaction and empathy across functions and divisions [9]. The adoption of DevOps is one example of a step to strengthen collaboration between IT teams, which is very much needed in software development and maintenance [10]

The DevOps method is proven to be able to reduce several development stages that existed in the old method [11]. DevOps is able to shorten the time between software development and operation without reducing the quality of the software itself [12]. DevOps reduces the gap between the development team, operations team and application users allowing to detect problems early. DevOps adoption can implement continuous development and more frequent application releases to users [13]. Not only that, DevOps also changes software engineering processes and practices to be faster which also increases the reliability, stability, resilience and security of the production environment [14].

2.3. Continuous Integration (CI)

[15] Continuous Integration is a method in software development, where code from each developer is combined and built periodically to detect errors as early as possible. In general, the stages in a CI system are as follows (triggered by push or commit commands):

1. Integrated

This is the stage where each developer integrates the codes or results of their work.

2. Compiled

Code is compiled into packages or executables

3. Tested

Test executables manually or automatically

- 4. Archived Archive executable files, test results, and logs during the process.
- 5. Deployed

Install or share build results.






Fig 2. Continuous Integration Architecture System

2.4. Continuous Deployment (CD)

[16] Continuous Deployment (CD) is a software release process that uses automated testing to validate whether changes to the code base are correct and stable for immediate autonomous deployment to a production environment.

The difference between continuous deployment and continuous delivery can be confusing due to the nomenclature. Both are abbreviated as CD and have very similar responsibilities. Delivery is the beginning of deployment. In delivery, there is a final manual approval step before production release.

In the delivery stage, developers will review and merge code changes which are then packaged into artifacts. This package is then moved to the production environment where it awaits approval to be opened for deployment. In the deployment phase, packages are opened and reviewed with an automated inspection system. If the check fails the package is rejected. When the checks pass, the package is automatically deployed to production.

Continuous Deployment can be a powerful tool for modern organizations. Deployment is the final step in the entire continuous pipeline consisting of integration, delivery and deployment. The true experience of continuous deployment is automation to the level where code is deployed to production, tested, and automatically reverted when there are errors, or accepted if there are no errors.

2.5. Docker Container

[17] A Docker container image is a lightweight, standalone, executable package of software that includes everything needed to run an application (code, runtime, system tools, system libraries and settings).

Containers separate software from its surroundings, for example the difference between development and staging, and are also a solution to conflicts between teams using different software on the same infrastructure.

2.6. Docker Swarm

Docker Swarm is an orchestration tool developed by Docker itself. Docker Swarm clusters allow one to add an unlimited number of nodes, and Docker allows one to run unlimited containers on nodes, this provides full-scale testing that is close to real conditions [18].

Docker Swarm provides clustering and an orchestration mechanism and thus can deploy several containers across different host machines. Docker Swarm also provides a fault tolerance mechanism not only by detecting failed containers on a host machine, but also redeploying the same container on another host machine [19].


2.7. Gitlab

Gitlab is a web-based Git, repository manager with a wiki, issue tracker and CI/CD pipeline. Gitlab uses an open source license developed by Gitlab Inc. In the release of Gitlab 10.0, Gitlab took a big step beyond just code management, but expanded into deployment and monitoring. Gitlab organizes and modifies people's permissions according to their roles and can provide issue tracking access without granting permissions to large pieces of code, which is great for teams and large companies with role-based contributions. Gitlab supports CI for free and is very useful for teams, besides that Gitlab also supports CI/CD automatically without human intervention [20]

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The software deployment automation system for the Product Development division and Operation division of PT EOA Teknologi Internasional consists of Gitlab as version control for developers to store source code, Continuous Integration (CI) Server and Continuous Deployment (CD) Server using the infrastructure provided by Gitlab, then Container Registry as a place to accommodate the Docker Image output from the Continuous Integration (CI) Server using services from Alibaba Cloud, and Elastic Compute Service (ECS) is the destination server for Continuous Deployment (CD). The server carries out software deployment after pulling the Docker Image from the Container Registry. Continuous Integration (CI) Server and Continuous Deployment (CD) Server when carrying out the integration or deployment process will provide output in the form of a running process log which can be seen on the account dashboard on the Gitlab site and provide notification via email if the Continuous Integration process or Continuous Deployment process has failed.








Fig 3. Software Deployment Automation System Design

Before the software deployment automation process can be carried out, the ECS for the software deployment destination must have Docker Engine and Docker Swarm installed, as well as the reverse proxy which in this study uses Traefik, must be configured and ready to use.

The entire Continuous Integration and Continuous Deployment process refers to scripts that have been prepared by the Operations division and have been submitted to the repository on Gitlab or version control. These scripts are in the form of .gitlabci.yml to manage the Continuous Integration and Continuous Deployment flow on the Gitlab CI/CD infrastructure. Dockerfile, stack.yml, and other supporting scripts required by the programming language in each application or repository.

The prototype of this software deployment automation system was built using the YAML (Yet Another Markup Language) programming language which is usually used to write configuration files. YAML is a popular programming language because it is human-readable and easy to understand. Meanwhile, the application used for software deployment automation testing uses the PHP programming language and the Laravel framework, because PHP and Laravel are popular programming languages and frameworks, that are widely used by developers.

IV. CONCLUSION

Software deployment that has been carried out using a software deployment automation system makes the results of software deployment in the development environment, staging environment and production environment consistent.

Because the software deployment process has been automated, there is no longer a work bottleneck in the Operations division because the software deployment process no longer requires human intervention after the software deployment automation system is configured at the start of creating the repository/project.

By building a software deployment automation system, human errors caused by the software deployment process being carried out manually can be minimized.

With the software deployment automation system, the software deployment process can be carried out at any time by the Product Development division, without having to ask the Operations division to stand by and intervene. This leads to shortened release cycle, increased deployment frequency thus improve software quality.

Suggestions from the author for the development of this system in the future:

- 1. In the future, this software deployment automation system can be developed using Kubernetes container orchestration with auto scaling.
- 2. Implement system monitoring using Grafana, Prometheus and other supporting applications.
- 3. This software deployment automation system can be developed to create a High Availability System.
- 4. There needs to be good cooperation between the Product Development division and the Operations division regarding the use of DevOps, Continuous Integration and Continuous Deployment methods.

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Bayah Dome Geopark Information System Based On Website Using Prototype Method

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Abstract – To realize a national Geopark and a World Geopark, it is necessary to socialize and disseminate information that can be accessed by the people of Lebak Regency in particular and the wider community in general to introduce all the geological heritage that has been determined by the Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources. Nowadays, digital information system technology has become an undeniable need, and has even become a source of information that can be accessed by all people in the world. The Bayah Dome Geopark management body in Lebak Regency does not yet have a website-based information system, so it is necessary to create a website-based Bayah Dome Geopark information system so that the Bayah Dome Geopark is known nationally and internationally. This research uses a Research and Development approach. Research procedures include: (a) analysis, (b) design, (c) implementation and (d) evaluation. Stage (a) analysis consists of two steps, namely literature study and field survey. The literature study examines concepts and theories relating to Geopark. Stage (b) design is carried out by designing a website with UML (Unified Modeling Language) which is a program design based on the results obtained in the analysis stage which includes: use case diagrams, activity diagrams using the prototype system development method. In stage (c) implementation, the results of the design are outlined and implemented into a website.

Geoparks which have aspects in the field of education as knowledge in the field of earth sciences regarding the uniqueness and diversity of earth heritage and economic aspects of the role of society in managing the area as geotourism.(Darsiharjo et al., 2016)Geoparks are managed for conventional purposes, education and sustainable community economic development with active involvement from the community and local government, so that they can be used to foster community understanding and concern for the earth and its surrounding environment. A Geopark is a single or combined geographic area, which has Geological Heritage Sites (Geosites) and valuable natural landscapes, related to aspects of Geological Heritage (Geoheritage), Geological Diversity (Geodiversity), Biodiversity (Biodiversity) and Cultural Diversity (Cultural Diversity), and managed for conventional purposes, education and sustainable community economic development with active involvement from the community and regional government,(Haryanto & Pirgana, 2021)

Lebak Regency has a lot of geological heritage as well as biodiversity and culture which has the potential to be developed into a national or even international class Geopark. Geoparks are a tool for sustainable development for people's welfare, which combines three diversities, namely geological, biological and cultural diversity so that with the Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources Regulation Number 1 of 2020 concerning Guidelines for Determining Geological Heritage (Geoheritage), Lebak Regency, Banten Province has Geological Heritage (Geoheritage) that meets the criteria to be protected, preserved and utilized as an object of research, earth education and geotourism.

The Bayah Dome Geopark is still an aspiring Geopark towards becoming a national Geopark. It is necessary to introduce the Bayah Dome Geopark to the wider community with information system technology. Bayah Dome Geopark is geotourism so the information system technology currently developing is expected to help disseminate information and promote geotourism widely both nationally and internationally. Not many people around and the wider community are familiar with the Bayah Dome Geopark, therefore there is a need for outreach or disseminating information to the community by utilizing an information system that can be accessed anywhere and at any time. The natural landscape of the Bayah area consists of hills and valleys, very interesting and unique. The whole thing forms an area known as the dome and is called the Bayah Dome. Three large rivers flow in this dome area, namely Ci Bareno on the east wing. Ci Madur is in the middle, and Ci Peucangceuri is in the western part of the dome. From the center to the south coast, this dome stretches the karst area.(Permadi, 2015)Therefore, it is necessary to build a Website-based Bayah Dome Geopark information system that can be accessed online. Currently, technology is widely used as a means of promotion and information, especially in the field of websites which are currently an information medium that offers various conveniences in presenting information. Speed and convenience are positive values of the internet.



Websites are more easily accessed by people in various regions just by using the internet.(Ismai, 2018)Geotourism destinations should be equipped with a clear and easy to understand information system. With a good information system, for example about the history of the formation of geological formations, it is hoped that tourists will understand the natural processes that occur. With information, people are also expected to be aware not to damage the beauty of the environment around geotourism.(Hermawan, 2018)The Bayah Dome Geopark management body in Lebak Regency does not yet have a website-based information system, so it is necessary to create a website-based information system for the Bayah Dome Geopark is known nationally and internationally.

This is also supported by the Strategic Plan and Research Master Plan of Serang Raya University which carries the theme "Development of Science and Technology, Economy and Culture of a Competitive Nation towards a Smart City" that the industrial era 4.0 encourages the use of the Internet of Things (IoT), the use of big data (big data), and quality engineering. It is hoped that Lebak Regency will become a smart city area in particular and the Banten Province region in general.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

This research uses a research and development (R&D) approach. Software development in the form of an Online Website Based Information System through an engineering approach with stages of analysis, design, implementation and evaluation. The following are the research stages:

The analysis stage is the first step in development, this stage consists of two steps, namely literature study, interviews and observations at the Bayah Dome Geopark Management Agency, Lebak Banten Regency. The literature study examines concepts and theories relating to the Information System and the Bayah Dome Geopark, while a field survey was carried out to collect data relating to the Bayah Dome Geopark data as well as information from the Bayah Dome Geopark Management Agency which is the object of the Information System.

The design stage is carried out with a program design based on the results obtained in the analysis stage, program design using UML (Unified Modeling Language). UML is a modeling language for systems or software with an 'object oriented' paradigm. Consists of: Class Diagram, Object Diagram, Use case diagram, Sequence diagram, Collaboration diagram, Statechart diagram, Activity diagram, Component diagram and Deployment diagram.(Wati & Kusumo, 2016)The program design in this research is based on the results obtained in the analysis stage which include: use case diagrams, activity diagrams, class diagrams. This website-based information system was built using the PHP, Javascript, CSS programming languages. Laravel Bootstrap Framework and MySQL database.

The system development method used in this research is the Prototype method. The Prototype method is a software development method, which is in the form of a physical model of the system's work and functions as an initial version of the system.(GILANG RAMDHANI PUTRA, 2020)The prototyping model focuses on presenting the aspects of the software that will be visible to the user. The stages of this prototyping development model are depicted in Figure 3 below.




Fig 2. Prototyping Development Model

In the implementation stage, the results of the design are expressed through a program, while the material components are implemented with content in the Bayah Dome Geopark Information System. then the system testing stage uses the System Usability Scale (SUS). Usability testing can be carried out on small or large software and on multiplatforms such as web-based, desktop or mobile. The focus of usability testing is that users find it easy to use the software.(Sembodo et al., 2021)The results of the program evaluation are used as material to carry out revisions both in terms of design and implementation.

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The results of this research include:

A. System Design

Use case diagram is a model to describe the relationships that occur between actors and activities contained in the system. A use case is a modeling of the behavior of the information system that will be created. 


Fig 3. Use Case Diagram




Fig 4. Visitor Activity Diagram

User activity diagrams is a diagram that describes the work flow or visitor activities of a system. From the use case in Figure 4, the Visitor Activity Diagram will be explained, including:




Fig 5. Activity Diagram admin




Fig 6. Class Diagram




Fig 11. Biodiversity menu




Fig 13. Website-based admin page

DEVELOPMENT OF ARTS LEARNING MEDIA USING AUGMENTED REALITY WITH MARKERLESS BASED TRACKING METHOD AT SMKN 47

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Abstract – During the transitional time between Covid-19 and endemic, all Indonesian schools, and SMKN 47 in particular, had restricted educational opportunities. Due to challenges encountered by the instructor and 36 students majoring in accounting in grade 12, they were unable to carry out teaching and learning activities at school; art lesson formats with three-dimensional learning modules must be visualized in 3D. However, with hybrid teaching and learning utilizing presentations, displaying the learned 3D forms is less successful. In order to visualize three dimensions in fine arts classes using augmented reality technology, we require a new learning medium. The application of the Markerless Based Tracking approach in this work enables the presentation of a tracked 3D model in the surrounding environment in real-time by merging the actual and virtual worlds as if their boundaries did not exist. The augmented reality system scans flat surfaces utilizing points, as opposed to markers or other auxiliary media. Points used as pedestals or containers to elevate three-dimensional items. There are three sculptures and three traditional dwellings on show. Online examination outcomes average resulted a 78.2% that the AR Fine Arts application by instructors and students are therefore consistent and well accepted.

Keywords - Augmented Reality, Arts Learning, Markerless Based Tracking

I. INTRODUCTION

Learning in all Indonesian schools is carried out online based on the decision of the Ministry of Education and Culture of the Republic of Indonesia with Circular Letter Number 4 of 2020 concerning the implementation of education during the Corona virus Disease (COVID-19) emergency period. SMKN 47, including schools in the red zone in the West Pejaten area, South Jakarta, is recommended to carry out teaching and learning activities online due to the pandemic. Based on interviews conducted with fine arts teachers at SMKN 47, 90% of the 36 grade 12 students majoring in accounting had difficulty understanding fine arts lessons, because the learning activity method was less interesting and difficult for students to understand. Therefore, we need a new visualization learning media to help teachers and students create interesting visualizations in teaching and learning even if they don't visit museums or galleries during this pandemic [1],[2].

In this research, the SMKN 47 school conducted online teaching and learning in accordance with the provisions of the Ministry of Education and Culture of the Republic of Indonesia, fine arts lessons are one of the lessons that require visualization aids in online fine arts subjects[3], [4],[5], because of the limited physical teaching aids which make teaching and learning activities ineffective, because during this pandemic Augmented Reality visualization can help in teaching and learning at SMKN 47 To overcome these problems, solutions are needed for teachers and students in the online learning process using Augmented Reality [6],[7]. With the help of Augmented Reality,

teachers can convey lessons to students more easily because of the new visualizations that will be provided, and students will understand better and not feel bored during class time [8]. Augmented Reality is a combination of the real world and the virtual world where the boundary between the two seems to be non-existent. The aim of Augmented Reality is to combine virtual and reality objects into one scope to interact with each other [9],[10].

The method used to overcome this problem is markerless based tracking with the help of the Vuforia SDK. The implementation in this research is to display 3D objects in the real world without using markers using realtime processing[11],[12]. The advantage of markerless based is that it only requires a flat surface such as a floor or table to scan to display an object. Previous research that also discussed markerless tracking was research from [13] where the research carried out was to utilize markerless tracking to learn about installing car engine spare parts where the results of this research stated that the use of markerless tracking could be used well. Other research conducted by [14] used markerless-tracking in game-based augmented reality applications and building space applications [15].

The results of this research that will be developed here are in the form of visualization learning media for fine arts lessons in the form of an Augmented Reality application with a total of 6 objects, namely 3 sculptures and 3 traditional houses using markerless based tracking to overcome problems in visualizing three-dimensional fine arts by utilizing Augmented Reality at SMKN 47 school using the markerless based tracking method.



II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

markerless based tracking is one method Augmented Reality which does not require special knowledge about the environment for the user to display virtual objects at a certain point[16], [17]. Camera onsmartphone will scan the surface to collect visual data from the real world, when you want to display a 3D model, it will process the scan without a special marker, the 3D model will be taken from the processmapping by taking data fromupdate, and scan the position of the 3D model on the floor to display the 3D model on the screensmartphone[18],[19].




Figure 1. FlowMarkerless Based Tracking

Figure 1 shows the flow of stages in the method processmarkerless based tracking which has four stages, namelyfeature extraction, mapping, update, propagation. The following is an explanation of the stages contained inmarkerless based tracking among others:

Feature Extraction

At this stage what is captured by the camera scans the surface to retrieve data from the real world from the system providing points as a fulcrumsegi curves, edges. After providing points for the basic pattern that will process displaying an object, the system will process creating the object directlyUpdate andMapping perform scanning in unknown environments without using markers or special printing media.

Stages Mapping

In levelmapping, camera captured byfeature extraction will be processed once when looking for points as a fulcrum. If points are detected by the image, it is possible that the 3D model displayed is unstable standing on the surface. Then the feature extraction process will carry out the process again in the same way and match the same points, and in the mapping process it will resemble the shape of the space surrounding the object that has been scanned byfeature extraction.

Propagation

Task onpropagation is ifsmartphone generating a new camera capture position or scanning to another location, will automatically process againupdate andmapping to produce a new position in the form of position data smartphone. IMU is a sensor used to measure three dimensions of an object. The IMU has three gyroscope axes (axespitch, roll, and yaw) and three accelerometer axes (x, y and z axes) which have their respective uses, including gyroscopes for measuring tilt angles, measuring changes in each axis tilt angle and accelerometers for measuring and identifying the correct direction of a smartphone, [20].

Update Stages

Features point that have been detected in the processfeature extraction will be updated by comparingfeatures point which is on the map.Update carried out to improve the mapping and propagation results with the newly detected feature points. Next comes the registration stage which uses tracking to connect virtual content with the real world. This section will continue to process because there will be unstable movement of the gyroscope, therefore this will occur frequently rendering in sectionpositioning ormapping. The process starts from virtual content to the real world, then by finding the best camera angle position, the virtual content will process the image first. Once the image is ready from the system, it will be scanned in this process to see if it has been fulfilled by the system in terms offeature extraction, andmapping. If you can interact with the application and scan with the camerasmartphone, in this pose tracking process the user can interact by moving the camera to see around the 3D model. With the IMU sensor data, the image will be stable because the movement of the pose is not realizedsmartphone unstable when taking pictures of objects that have been scanned on a table or other flat place.

Mechanism Augmented Reality

A. Input

Users run applications that are ready to use on an Android smartphone. After going through the menu display, the user will select the 3D art menu, the application model will immediately switch to the cameraAugmented Reality. Next, the user directs the camera indicator mark. In the cameraAugmented Reality, there is a choice of 3D fine art models ranging from traditional houses, and sculptures from various regions, these objects are chosen by the user to display. Next, press the icon button for the desired 3D model to display it in the specified place.

B. Process

On camerasmartphone directed at the floor surface, the system will identify the positionsmartphone with Vuforia SLAM (Egodagamage and Tuceryan, 2018), (Marchand et al., 2016), (Cortes et al., 2018) to display camera indicators, and determine the position of the object you want to display in the real world. By using the methodmarkerless based tracking will process the mechanism or flowmarkerless based tracking in figure 6. After processing the mechanismmarkerless The user scans a flat surface to locate a 3D object. Next, the system will display the appropriate 3D model selected by the user with the specified object placement.

C. Output

The result of the general architecture is a visual art visualization information in the form of a virtual object selected by the user, with the help of smartphone The object will display on the screensmartphone. The 3D model displayed on the floor surface is a form of visualization of images that have been processed so that it helps teachers



and students with teaching aids Augmented Reality desired fine art. The output is provided with the object process that has been directed, the user can process the dimensional shape and rotate the object.

Validation Testing

Validation testing was carried out in this research to ensure whether it can be accepted by teachers and students so that learning becomes interactive and increases students' knowledge in fine arts lessons by using Augmented Reality, the demographic profile of the respondents in this study are teachers and students from SMKN 47, where the profiles of the 38 respondents who have been collected are dominated by 17-19 year olds with 36 students and the remaining 2 respondents aged 25-35 with the teaching profession, a total of 38 Respondents consisted of 36 students and 2 teachers.

Online Testing Questionnaire Results

The following is a questionnaire that has been filled in by 70 respondents from AKL 1 (Institutional Accounting and Finance) and BDP 1 (Online Business and Marketing) classes at SMKN 47: Teachers and students experience difficulties during teaching and learning activities with textbooks. The first point to note asked whether teachers and students experienced difficulties during learning activities with textbooks, below in Figure 14 are the percentage results from the first point of the questionnaire.




Figure 7. Percentage of results from questionnaire one Figure 7 shows that 32.9% of 23 respondents strongly agree, 38.6% of 27 respondents agree, 15.7% of 11 respondents are neutral, 10% of 7 respondents disagree and 2.9% of 2 respondents strongly disagree. The average score for the first point is 78%. This result shows that the first score point is that teachers and students accept the first point statement, namely agreeing to the difficulties in teaching and learning with textbooks.

The second point asked whether teachers and students experienced difficulties during online learning activities. Below in Figure 8 are the percentage results from the second point of the questionnaire.




Figure 8. Percentage of second questionnaire results Figure 8 shows that 28.6% of 20 respondents strongly agree, 35.7% of 25 respondents agree, 22.9% of 16 respondents are neutral, 11.4% of 8 respondents disagree and 1.4% of 1 respondent strongly don't agree. The average score for the second point is 76%. This result shows that the score points for both teachers and students accept the second point statement, namely agreeing with the difficulties in teaching and learning online.




Figure 9. Percentage of third questionnaire results

The third point asked whether the AR Fine Arts Application is easy to understand and can operate well, below in Figure 9 is the percentage result of the third point questionnaire.

Figure 9 shows that 27.1% of 19 respondents strongly agree, 34.3% of 24 respondents agree, 20% of 14 respondents are neutral, 14.3% of 10 respondents disagree and 4.3% of 3 respondents strongly disagree. The average score for the third point is 75%. That these results show that the third score point is that teachers and students accept the third point statement, namely agreeing that the AR Fine Arts Application is easy to understand and can operate well.

The fourth point asked whether teachers and students were really helped by the AR fine arts application, below in Figure 10 is the percentage result of the third point of the questionnaire.

Figure 11 shows that 28.6% of 20 respondents strongly agree, 32.9% of 23 respondents agree, 30% of 21 respondents are neutral, and 8.6% of 6 respondents disagree.

The average score for the fourth point is 76%. This result shows that the score of the fourth point is that teachers and students accept the statement on the fourth point, namely that they agree that teachers and students are greatly helped by the AR Fine Arts application.

The fifth point asked whether the AR fine art application could be a new innovation in teaching and learning activities, below in Figure 4.22 is the percentage result of the third point of the questionnaire.




Figure 12. Percentage of Fifth Questionnaire Results Figure 12 shows that 58.6% of 41 respondents strongly agree, 21.4% of 15 respondents agree, 15.7% of 11 respondents are neutral, and 4.3% of 3 respondents disagree. The average score for the fifth point is 87%.

These results show that the fifth score point is that teachers and students accept the fifth point statement, namely that they strongly agree that the AR Fine Arts Application can be a new innovation in teaching and learning activities. After the average of each point has been obtained, then calculate the average percentage of the total points from user testing. The overall average percentage point calculation is as follows:

Calculation results of the average percentage of overall questionnaire points from testing were 78.2%. So it can be said in the results of the assessment interval that 78.2% of teachers and students agreed and were well received.

IV. CONCLUSION

Based on the results obtained from this research, it can be concluded that the method markerless based tracking was successful in detecting the surface when implemented even though the manufacturing process was still imperfect due to the camera's lack of clarity in searching for surface points to display the object. The results of online testing regarding the AR Fine Art Application produced an average of 78.2%. So it can be said that the results of testing the AR Fine Arts application by teachers and students agreed and were well received.

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Implementation of The Resident's Dues Applications (SIUMAS) Using Waterfall Method in RT X Cinere Village

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Abstract – Payment of dues is one of the obligations that must be fulfilled by every resident in a neighborhood association area. These dues are used for common purposes such as cleanliness and security. The collection and expenditure of dues are usually handled by the management committee. However, there are still difficulties in managing residents' dues using conventional methods. As a result, dues cards are often lost and the dues collection are not transparent. Therefore, the author developed The Resident's Dues Application (SIUMAS) as a solution used to manage residents' dues. The purpose of developing this application is to simplify the management tasks of the committee in handling the collection and expenditure of dues, as well as to facilitate residents in tracking the utilization of the dues. This application was developed by applying the waterfall method which consists of several stages, starting from analysis to the maintenance process. In addition, this application adopts an object-based application design method. The results of the SIUMAS application testing using Black Box Testing shown that all functionalities of the SIUMAS application are functioning well and meet the expectations.

I. INTRODUCTION

The development of information and communication technology has a significant impact on society's social life. People need services that are functional, fast, transparent, and accurate. The role of technology is very important in providing good public services, starting from the RT/RW level. Ease of access and use of information technology in various fields, such as education, health, business, and government administration, provides various benefits. The public can quickly get information at a lower cost than traditional methods, while the government can manage public services more easily and transparently.

In RT areas, environmental safety and cleanliness are very important for the comfort of residents. To achieve this goal, residents formed a security and cleaning team and collected fees. However, the process of recording and publishing dues collections is still done manually and is less effective. To increase efficiency and transparency, an application is needed that can assist in recording and publishing dues collections. At RT X in Cinere Village for example, they feel that having application technology that can be accessed transparently can help citizens monitor contribution funds. This application is used to help manage fees, provide transparency to residents, and ultimately increase the effectiveness of security and cleanliness programs in the RT area.

To support this community program, the author developed an application called Resident's Dues Application (SIUMAS). SUIMAS aims to assist RT administrators in recording and reporting the use of dues funds transparently to the community in the RT area or areas that use this application. With SUIMAS, the public can easily check and monitor the number of dues funds they have paid and how these funds are used. This will create transparency and accountability in the management of dues funds so that it can create a clean RT environment and good government [1].

Prior to this research, there had been previous research conducted by A.P. Sutrisno et al. (2022) which discusses the design and development of waste dues applications using the Android-based Rapid Application Development method [2]. In this research, the development of an Android-based waste fee application was carried out due to the problems of residents who had difficulty managing waste fees manually. As a result, after the application was developed and tested, the application could run well and meet the needs of residents.

Then next, there is research from N.G. Salsabila et al. (2021) regarding the creation of a series of citizen application modules for managing citizen contribution wallets [3]. This application was created to make it easier for administrators and residents to manage and supervise the collection and use of contribution funds. Then, there is also research from F. Wahyudi (2020) regarding the design of a web-based committee dues application. In this research, the application was designed based on the problems caused by the previous conventional contribution collection method. This application helps the process of paying committee dues [4]. Apart from that, several other studies which also have the same focus and objectives include Rahman and Aryani regarding the application of



citizen fees using Java [5], Alviana and Kurniawan's research on the Citizen Fee Information System [6], Siregar et al. research on the Security Fee System [7] and Sari and Kholil's research on Citizen Applications [8].


The author developed the SUIMAS application by proposing an object-oriented method, which focuses on design and implementation. The application was developed by applying the waterfall method which consists of several stages, starting from analysis to the maintenance process [9]. By using waterfall method, the author can implement the SUIMAS application quickly and purposefully. To support the development process, the author utilizes the Unified Modeling Language (UML) which is very suitable for the method used [10]. Some of the tools that the author also uses include MySQL for the database [11] and the PHP programming language for implementing the coding [12].

Finally, this research produced a resident's dues application that can be used by the RT X Cinere Village in the dues payment process. The reliability of the application has been tested using the black box method where the results show that all functions can run properly [13]. Of course, this application can also be adopted by other parties who have a similar process.

II. RESEARCH METHODS

The research method used to design the Resident's Dues Application (SIUMAS) is object-based design analysis. In this method, research will focus on analysis and application design based on object-oriented programming principles. This involves identifying and modeling the objects involved in the system, as well as the relationships and interactions between these objects. This object-based design analysis method aims to create good and effective designs in meeting the needs of application users and ensuring the sustainability and scalability of the application.

In this waterfall methodology, research is focused on understanding information about user needs for software. The information collection method is determined through discussion, observation, surveys and interviews. This information is then processed and analyzed to obtain complete data or information regarding user perceptions. and software to be developed [14].

1. Analysis

This step involves analyzing software requirements and collecting data through meetings with customers as well as collecting additional information from journals, articles, and the internet.

2. Planning

The planning process is a continuation of needs analysis (communication). This stage produces user requirements documents or data related to user desires in creating software, including implementation plans.

3. Modeling

The modeling process translates requirements into a predictable software design before code generation. The focus is on data structure design, software architecture, interface representation, and procedural details (algorithms). This stage produces documents called software requirements.

4. Construction

The construction phase involves coding. Coding or coding translates a design into a language that can be recognized by a computer. The programmer translates the transactions requested by the user. This stage is the real stage in software creation, where computer use is maximized. After coding is complete, the system that has been created will be tested to find errors which can then be corrected.

5. Deployment

This stage can be considered the final stage in creating software or systems. After analyzing, designing and coding, the finished system will be used by users. Software that has been created must undergo regular maintenance after implementation.

Object-oriented design is defining all types of objects that are important for communicating with humans and equipment in the system and showing how objects interact with each other to complete certain work and improve the function of each type of object so that it can be implemented with a special language or environment [15].




Fig 2. SIUMAS research methodology

Based on figure 2 steps of the research is:



1. Identification of problems

At this stage, the author collects information to analyze the dues collection methods that are being implemented in RT X. Then, the author identified any problems that occurred using the dues collection method that was being implemented at that time and then looked for solutions. 2. Object Based Design

At this design stage, the application design is described SIUMAS object based. This design includes designing use case diagrams, activity diagrams, class diagrams, and sequence diagrams.

3. Program Implementation and Testing

At this stage, the application code is written so that the application can be built and the results tested using the black box testing method [16]. The technology used to build SUIMAS includes the programming language and database used.

The programming language used to build SIUMAS is PHP. PHP (Hypertext Preprocessor) is a server-side scripting language, a programming language used to build static websites, dynamic websites, or web applications [17]. The database used for the application SIUMAS is MySQL. MySQL is a server that serves databases. To create and process a database, you are required to learn special programming called SQL queries [18].

In an application testing session SIUMAS, Black box testing was chosen to test the course of the application process. Black Box Testing is a type of testing that involves software without paying attention to how its internals work. In this testing, testers see the software as a "black box" entity that does not need to understand the internal details, but still carries out the testing process on the external part [19].

4. Conclusion

At this stage, the conclusions of the research conducted by the author are written.

III. **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**

Citizen dues activities at RT X Cinere Village still using the manual method with printed dues cards which will be checked every month by officers. Residents who are visited by officers will pay their fees, then their printed dues cards will be marked as proof of payment. Printed fee cards have disadvantages such as being easily lost, so officers must carry replacement printed fee cards. In addition, contribution data could potentially be lost. Then, the amount of fees collected is also not transparent to residents because the total is on their respective printed contribution cards.

Based on the problem analysis above, the problems faced by RT X Cinere Village is the lack of transparency in the number of dues. Apart from that, it is also inefficient to use printed dues cards. So, the author created a Resident's Dues Application (SIUMAS) which can be used to help record and publish resident's dues.

As explained in the research methodology chapter, to assist the author in designing and developing the SUIMAS application, the author utilized the UML tool. Some of the diagrams that the author put forward are:

A. Use Case Diagram Design




Fig 3. Use case diagram of SIUMAS





Fig 4. Activity diagram of SIUMAS

In the SIUMAS activity diagram design, there are two main activity flows, namely activity admin and biller as shown in Figure 4.

In the SIUMAS class diagram design, as can be seen in Figure 4, there are 5 main class entities, namely Billing




Users, Admin Users, Biller, Dues, Family, and Expenditures.

The author also designed a sequence diagram for the SUIMAS application to find out in more detail the processes running in the application. The results are as in Figure 6.




E. Program Implementation


1. Home Page SIUMAS

IV. CONCLUSION

As a recommendation from the author for further research, RT administrators who will use the SIUMAS application can be given socialization on the use of the application. Apart from that, after the socialization is carried out, a survey can also be given to find out the level of public acceptance of the SIUMAS application.

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Implementation of Android-Based Tailoring Service Ordering Application with Geolocation Integration

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Abstract – Basic needs are an aspect that cannot be separated from human life, and one of the important aspects of these basic needs is clothing which not only functions to protect the body but also plays a role in the world of fashion. To meet these fashion needs, tailoring services have a key role in providing clothes that suit consumer desires. While this need is important, customers often rely on conventional methods, such as word-of-mouth recommendations or seeking out a familiar tailor. Some tailors may have a sign in front of their house, but it is often difficult for potential customers to find and connect with them. Therefore, this research aims to implement a tailor service ordering application that is integrated with geolocation features and can make things easier for tailors and consumers. This application development uses the Java programming language and Android Studio as the framework and Firebase as the database. The result of this research is an application that allows customers to order tailor services via smartphone anywhere and anytime.

I. INTRODUCTION

Clothing or clothing needs are one of the main aspects of human life [1]. In the past, clothing was used primarily as a means of protection for the body. However, over time, clothing has transformed, and one of its important roles today is to provide comfort in various situations, such as when dealing with important moments in life. In the history of technological development, humans have developed various tools to produce clothing, ranging from simple sewing machines to sophisticated modern sewing machines [2].

The increasingly rapid development of technology has brought convenience to various aspects of people's lives. One way is through an online goods and services ordering application [3]. With the help of smartphones, people can now order a variety of products and services without having to leave the comfort of their homes.

The tailoring business sector is very popular among the public, attracting the interest of many individuals to start a business in this sector, especially because of its promising profit potential [4]. Sewing courses are also increasingly in demand, with many people taking them to develop skills that can later be used in setting up their own tailoring business [5].

Even though many people have opened tailoring services, many consumers still face difficulties when ordering this service directly at the tailoring business location [6]. This process is considered quite complicated because consumers must measure their body size and choose their clothing materials. In addition, difficulties arise if consumers cannot meet with the tailor due to schedule inconsistencies. This condition can reduce efficiency because consumers are forced to come repeatedly to the tailoring service.

Apart from that, another additional problem is the schedule conflict that often arises between the schedule submitted by the customer and the tailor's schedule. Sometimes, the schedule agreed upon by both parties does not always match the initial agreement, resulting in a situation where the customer must return without success and wait another day.

To overcome several challenges mentioned above, this research aims to develop a mobile application designed with a feature for ordering tailoring services using geolocation integration [7]. The app will allow users to book tailoring services and confirm their location and order details easily. Within the framework of this research, we will design and analyze this mobile application system as an innovative solution for the needs of ordering tailoring services.

Previous research has focused on developing various applications and platforms for ordering tailoring services. Reference [8], introduces an application that allows consumers to create and view their orders while providing the ability to enter tailor data. Reference [9] notes the development of a platform in the form of a website for ordering tailoring services online. The analysis process in this research adopts the prototyping method, which involves creating a prototype model for testing before creating the final product. The platform involves three types of users, each having a unique role. Admin is responsible for confirming payments made by buyers, while buyers can easily order tailoring services online. Tailors themselves have access to add and update their tailoring services through the website.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY




Fig1. Application Architecture

Previously, the result of this research was the development of an application that allows users to order sewing services via mobile smartphones. During the development of this application, Location Based Service (LBS) was integrated as the main method [10]. The application structure and design can be illustrated in detail in Figure 1.




Figure 2 above illustrates the application flow, which

In Figure 5, the home page contains various information about the customization services available for consumer orders. On this page, users will find various navigation buttons that allow them to move to different sections, including buttons that lead to relevant information pages.

The next process involves the application coding stage. For application development, Android Studio is used as an integrated development environment (IDE) specifically designed by Google and JetBrains to create Android applications [12]. Android Studio is currently capable of supporting two programming languages used in application development: Java and Kotlin. In this research, application development was carried out using the Java programming language.

The database system used in this project is Firebase which is an application development solution designed by Google [13]. Firebase offers various related features, including the use of a non-SQL database capable of storing various data types such as strings, integers, and booleans [14]. Firebase is often used in the development of Android-based applications. The output of this non-SQL database is usually in JSON or XML format, which can then be processed by the application as needed [15].

In the figure above, you can see the visualization of the developed application. The first image (from left to right) shows the initial interface of the application which serves as the login page. On this page, the user has the option to switch to the registration view if they do not yet have an account. Based on the test results in Table 1 above, there are no problems when users log in to the application. However, if



the user enters the wrong username or password, the system will issue a warning. After the user enters the correct login details, they will be directed directly to the dashboard based on their user role.

IV. CONCLUSION

Based on the results of the research conducted, it is evident that Android applications have great potential to improve location-based on-demand ordering services. Using location-based services and advanced integration into Android programming, the app can effectively identify the location of customers ordering tailoring services. This helps the service provider or tailor deliver the order more easily and quickly.

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Forecasting Blood Demand Using the Support Vector Regression Method (Case Study: Blood Transfusion Unit-PMI Central Lombok)

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Abstract – Blood is an important component produced by the human body. Blood is also a very vital part of human survival. When blood levels in the human body are less than they should be, the way to overcome this is by donating blood or blood transfusion. The health facilities that organize blood donations, provide blood and distribute blood are called Blood Transfusion Units (UTD). UTD in carrying out its duties encountered several obstacles, such as blood only having a shelf life of 35 days from donation. If it has passed the expiration date, it cannot be used anymore for blood transfusions. Meanwhile, regarding the demand for blood, the need for blood is greater than those donating. Making it difficult for UTD if the demand occurs when the existing blood stock is not sufficient. And if the stock in UTD experiences an axcess, it can cause losses because the blood is wasted due to expiration. Apart form that. The problem is that in everyday life, many people's need for blood is reduced. Many of their families intervened directly to find available donors. They even search on social networks or social media such as WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram and others. And this shows that many of them lack donors. To anticipate these problems. So it is necessary to carry out research on forecasting blood demand using the Support Vektor Regression method at UTD PMI Central Lombok. The aim of this research is to forecast or predict the demand for blood at UTD PMI Central Lombok in the coming period. To reduce the impact of lack or excess blood. SVR is the application of Support Vektor Machine (SVM) in the case of regression to find the best dividing line in the regression function. The advantage of the SVR model is that it can handle overfiting problems in the data. The tests used to measure the best model are Mean Squared Error (MSE), Root Mean Squared Error (RMSE), Mean Absolute Percentage Error (MAPE) and Coefficient of Determination (R2). The results of this research shows that the best model is Support Vektor Regression (SVR) with a polynomial kernel and based on the tuning results, the parameters used are C=10, degree=1, epsilon=1. The SVR model using a polynomial kernel produces a MAPE value of 18.7502% and RMSE value of 0.6919, which means the model has very good predictive ability. Prediction accuracy was achieved with an R2 value of 0.9936 or 99.36% and an MSE value of 0.4787, which means that the prediction of blood demand data at UTD PMI Central Lombok using SVR with a polynomial kernel function had very good prediction accuracy. With predicted result in january for blood type A it was 1654, B was 920, O was 2205 and AB was 1104.

I. INTRODUCTION

Blood is an important component produced by the human body. Blood is also the important part of human survival. In general, the function of blood is as a means of transportation in the body such as O_2 , CO_2 , nutrition, metabolism, hormones, heat and body immunity [1]. When blood level in the human body are less than they should be, the way to overcome this is by donating blood or blood transfusion [2]. Blood transfusion is the process of donating blood voluntarily by someone, which will later be used to help people in need [3][4].

In indonesian, the need for blood continues to increase every year, this happens because blood is needed for accidents and planned operations. Blood donation is a very important thing but is often forgotten. The indonesian Red Cross an one of the blood providers is currently experiencing limitations due to a lack of blood supply for patients, because according to WHO (World Health Organization), ideally blood availability is 2% of the population, meaning that indonesian currently needs 4.6 million bags of blood but PMI only received less than 0.5% of this need in 2005 [5][6]. In accordance with Government Regulation Number 7 of 2011 concerning Blood Transfusion Services, Minister of Health Regulation Number 83 of 2014 concerning Blood Transfusion Units and Minister of Health Regulation Number 14 of 2021 concerning Related Standards relating to commercial activities and products. In implementing risk-based commercial licensing. In the health sector, the health service facility that organizes blood donations, provides blood and distributes blood is the Blood Transfusion Unit (UTD) [[7][8]. UTD in organizing blood donations, providing and distributing blood, there are several obstacles such as the nature of blood which has a limited shelf life [9]. Or is easily damaged [10]. Quantity requested and amount of blood available at UTD. For example, blood has as a shelf life of 35 days from donation. If it has passed the expiration date, it cannot be used anymore for blood transfusion [11]. Meanwhile, regarding the demand for blood, the need for blood is greater than those donating, making it difficult for UTD if the demand occurs when the



existing blood stock is not sufficient. And if the stock in UTD experiences an excess, it can cause losses because the blood is wasted due to expiration [12]. Apart from that, the problem is that in everyday life, many of their families intervened directly to find willing donors. They even search on social networks or social media such as WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram and others. And this shows that many of them have not had their blood needs met.

To anticipate losses if there is an excess or shortage of blood, forecasting is necessary. Forecasting is the activity of estimating, predicting future events to provide blood reserves to meet blood needs in the future [13]. The method used is Support Vektor Regression (SVR). The application of Support Vektor Machines (SVM) in regression cases with output in the form of real numbers or sequential data is called SVR [14]. SVR is an algorithm that can overcome the problem of overfitting where a good model is produced from training data and not test data. a data that at the training stage produces almost perfect prediction accuracy values is called Overfitting [15].

Research conducted by [16] with the title Support Vektor Regression for Forecasting Blood Demand: Case Study of UTD Branch-PMI Malang City to Determine Optimal Norms for SVR Parameters in predicting Blood Demand in PMI Malang City. Based on the results of blood data simulations for the 2010-2014 period, a minimum MAPE .value of 3,899% was obtained with parameter values

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY




Fig 1. Research Steps

The steps taken in this research is began with a literature rivew, collecting data, pre-processing data, modeling, evaluating, implementing, and drawing conclusions. These processes shown in the diagram below in figure 1.

2.1 Literature Review

at this stage, a literature study is carried out or collecting information based on references from books, journals, and some research related to the study, a national and international research. Literature studies also discuss theories that are relevant to the research and lambda=10, sigma=0.5, cLR= 0.01, C=0.1, epsilon=0.01, number of data features=4 and the number of iterations is 5000, from 12 test data used. The resulting MAPE value is <10% and can be said to be good for predicting the amount of blood needed. Meanwhile, research was also carried out regarding forecasting blood demand which was carried out by [17] by taking a case study in Malang City. In his research, it was concluded that based on the experimental result obtained, the accuracy value produced by the system in the Fuzzy Time Series Interval Optimization research using Particle Swarm Optimization in predicting blood needs was 92.49670% with an error rate (MAPE) of 7.50330% which was obtained from the error calculation results from actual data with forecasting results on 12 test data. in addition, research conducted by [18] used the SVR method to predict monthly rainfall. The SVR prediction results obtained show that the SVR prediction method is very effective in predicting rainfall with forecast accuracy obtained by testing the RMSE value against the SVR model parameter values. The best RMSE is 0.038800637 with gamma of 0.0005, C of 0.0001, and epsilon of 1. Based on the problems presented and research references, the author proposes research entitled "forecasting blood demand using the Support Vektor Regression method (Case Study: Blood Transfusion Unit - PMI Central Lombok)". Hopefully the results of this research can help blood transfusion units adjust blood stocks.

2.2 Data Collection

This data collection was carried out by conducted a survey directly at the research site or field, namely UTD PMI Central Lombok. The data used in this research was incoming and outgoing blood data from March 2021 to December 2022 at UTD PMI Central Lombok.




Fig 4. Data Missing



d. Data Outlier

Outliers are data that deviate too far from other data in a data series (outliers). The existence of outliers will bias the analysis of a series of data.



e. Data Transformation

Transformation is the stage of making the data to be processed according to the model or algorithm that you want to use in the data processing stage. Data that past the data selection and data cleaning will be transformed, aiming to the distribution of the data so that the data becomes normal data and is easier to group. Data transformation here means changing categorical values into numerical values by utilizing the source code provided by Sklearn, such as the label encoder. In Figure 7, the columns that are transformed are the goal-in column, the goal-out column, the blood type column and the age column. The age column is binned first, after which it continues to the transformation stage.

In this SVR model there are three kernels, namely the linear kernel, polynomial kernel and radial basis function (RBF) kernel. These three kernels will be tested using train data and good results will be selected for forecasting. a support vector regression diagram can be seen below:




Fig 8. Support Vector Regression Steps

2.5 Evaluation

after getting good results from all three kernels. Then, an evaluation stage was carried out using MAPE, MSE, RMSE and d2. After the evaluation results for the SVR model and the three evaluation methods come out, the next stage is to make predictions. If the combination of kernel functions, parameters, and kernel evaluation used gives good results, then predictions can be made using the test data that was provided at the time of data sharing.

2.6 Implementation

This stage is carried out based on the results of tests that

have been carried out previously. This implementation includes algorithm implementation and interface______ implementation using the Python programming language with the Jupyter notebook editor.

2.7 Conclusion

At this stage, conclusions are drawn after passing through the initial stages of literature study to system testing and analysis which the result in conclusions based on the results of the research carried out by the author. Drawing conclusions is used to answer the problem formulation that has been formulated before. And provide suggestions for further research.

III.RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

3.1 SVR Models

The data used in this research was 2075. The data was divided into 2, namely 80% training data or 2164 data, while 20% was test data amounting to 541 data. Then the training data is used to find the value of each kernel, including:

a. Linear Kernels

The linear kernel is to look for the x_{train} , y_{train} scores and x_{test} , y_{test} scores. The scores obtained

are for the x_train, y_train scores of 0.3703 and for the x test, y test scores of 0.4006. as in figure 9.

Based on table 1, it can be concluded that, based on the three kernels. The kernel used to make predictions is a polynomial kernel. After getting the best SVR model, proceed with improving the model using tuning parameters. Tuning parameters are used to increase the



score of x_train, y_train and x_test, y_test and find the best parameters. Based on the tuning results, it cn be seen that C=10, degree= 1, epsilon= 1 and cross validation(cv)=4 with a score of x_train, y_train of 0.9959 and for the score of x_test, y_test of 0.9946 with a best_score of 0.9944. So it can be concluded that the score has increased very well.

3.2 error evaluation

In this research, the calculation of prediction accuracy uses R2, while the prediction error calculation uses MSE, RMSE and MAPE.

Based on table 2, it can ne explains that in this study the error calculation was that the MSE value was 0.4064, the RMSE value was 0.6375 and the MAPE value was 22.1498%. and the calculation of accuracy or precision of predictions using R2 is 99.46%. It means that the SVR model with a polynomial kernel is more accurate in predicting blood demand at UTD PMI Central Lombok. After calculating the error evaluation, the next step is to predict blood demand for the next period. This is the prediction of results to be obtaine for the next month:

Based on the pictures above, it can be explained that the prediction results are in January. For incoming blood group A of 9 and outgoing blood group A of 9, the prediction result obtained is 1655. Next, for incoming blood group B of 5 and outgoing blood group of 5, the prediction result obtained is 920. Furthermore, for the incoming blood group O of 12 and the outgoing blood group of 12, the prediction result is 2205. Meanwhile, for incoming blood group AB of 6 and outgoing blood group of AB of 6, the predicted result is 1104.

IV.CONCLUSION

Based on the discussion above, it can be concluded that the SVR model used is a poly kernel because the results shows was very good. With the parameters used, namely C= 10, degree = 1, epsilon=1, this means that the poly kernel is able to overcome the overfitting problem in predicting blood demand at UTD PMI Central Lombok. forecasting blood demand at UTD PMI Central Lombok using support vector regression with a polynomial kernel. then the MSE obtained is 0.4787, the RMSE is 0.6919 and the MAPE value is 18.7502%, which means that the forecasting accuracy is very good or the model has very good forecasting capabilities. The R2 value is 0.9936 or 99.36%, which means that the prediction of blood demand data at UTD PMI Central Lombok using SVR with a polynomial kernel function has very good accuracy or prediction accuracy results. With predicted results in January for blood type A of 1654, B of 920, O of 2205 and AB of 1104.

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Improving Firebase BaaS Service Security in Counseling Chat Applications: AES-256 and CBC Approach for End-to-End Encryption

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Abstract – The activities of using the internet and exchanging information and sending messages have used a lot of internet media, one of which is chat message media, but over time data and information security problems in chat messages that are often encountered are active and passive wiretapping. In this research, the author wants to create a counseling chat message security application using the AES (Advanced Encryption Standard) algorithm cryptographic method combined with the CBC (Cipher Block Chaining) technique which is an advanced development of the ECB (Electronic Code Book) technique. AES basically uses a block cipher with a length of 128 bits as the default operation, and the key length size varies from 128, 192 and 256 bits. so AES uses a 4x4 matrix equation with each section having a size of 1 byte. From these problems, research will be conducted to develop an application to accommodate the counseling process using a chat application that has the main focus of securing messages with image types and stored in the Firebase database service (Backend as a Service). As well as using the End-to-End service principle so that users do not need to do the encryption or decryption process directly because the process has been carried out by the system, this will also provide more security aspects in terms of confidentiality of key data and initialization vectors. So that the process of exchanging information using the media chat counseling application is secured and avoids tapping by irresponsible parties.

I. INTRODUCTION

The need for counselling for school students is one of the means that must be available in every school, this is not just because of the formality in the subjects and curriculum accompanied by the school. But counselling has a position in building the personality and mentality of student participants in experiencing various problems such as career paths or further learning [1]. The counselling process can be tried by teachers with various procedures that have existed and tried so far, but with the rapid growth of technology and data, the teaching procedures related to counselling must be able to explore this growth and one of them is by using internet-based communication technology. Based on the explanation of the case, the author wants to create a practical message application or chat by implementing the AES algorithm, which is not only able to accommodate the counselling process but also takes into account the security aspects and confidentiality of student information as a form of privacy that must be protected. The procedure that can be used in securing chat messages is cryptography, which is a scientific discipline that focuses on methods of hiding messages so that they are not known to unauthorised parties. But in the modern definition of cryptography, it is closer to the basic science in the field of informatics with the aim of securing data, protecting the integrity of information or authenticating an entity so that modern cryptography has a more complex purpose [2].

In its application, cryptographic procedures can use methods of securing messages by changing messages and hiding the meaning of messages by encryption and decryption processes. In this procedure, something is known as encryption which can be interpreted as a code or chipper. Cryptographic procedures have many encoding methods and types that can be applied in various aspects of pc, data, or network security, not only that this procedure also allows the combination of some algorithms in it so that the system built by this procedure has a strong level of security [3]. Basically, cryptography can be categorized into two parts, symmetric cryptography and asymmetric cryptography, both of which have their own algorithmic derivatives [4]. In this research, the symmetric key cryptography method will be applied using the AES encryption algorithm. AES (Advanced Encryption Standard) is a continuation of the development of the DES (Data Encryption System) algorithm then the AES algorithm slowly acts as a replacement for DES because the DES algorithm has weaknesses in the hardware sector, namely the problem of using keys that are too long. The AES algorithm has advantages over its predecessor, namely a high security system and has several types of levels with different key lengths to support security. The AES algorithm has another advantage, namely relatively fast and efficient computing speed with 128-bit keys but also provides 192 and 256 keys for complex computations [5].

In the AES algorithm based on the shortest key length of 128-bit, the AES algorithm is resistant to exhaustive key search attacks and the AES algorithm is also proven to be able to withstand square attacks where this attack utilises the byte approach structure. If the length of AES is 128-bit then it allows this attack to accelerate iterations 6 times faster than AES, but this algorithm is able to survive with more cycles so that the resulting resilience by this type of attack [6]. Then the source of the literature review used by the author based on previous research with the same research family, among others, is the AES algorithm as a block algorithm based on the classic logic operation (XOR) which again operates on both binary states 0 and 1. This research proposes a modification by replacing the XOR operation between binary (0,1) with (#) on a 256 state table

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


that works with a specified 8-bit. Although it provides more complexity, this modification succeeds in providing efficient encryption and decryption processing time and provides more security against differential attacks [7]. The process of securing data in email messages with the AES algorithm method is possible using the java programming language and the netbeans platform. The encryption process mechanism is based on the transformation of SubByte, ShiftRows, MixColumns and AddAroundKey while the decryption will produce an inverse cipher of the encryption process transformation [8]. Data security in cloud computing is also an important issue with the encryption data authentication method through the conversion of cipher blocks into cipher streams by separating text into several AES-256 encryption blocks [9]. In the process of sharing and transferring data on cloud computing technology, there is a risk of data theft, therefore the application of encryption using AES in the data transfer process is a worthy preventive measure as a security system [10]. Data in the form of audio can be encrypted using the AES-128 method and allows using analogue signals in With an audio communication. FPGA (Field Programmable Gate Array) device, namely Artix-7 (xc7a200tlffg1156-2L) and Kintex-7 (xc7k160tffg676-2L) as well as the VIVADO tool application. further simulation and delay configuration by reducing the column matrix operation in the AES algorithm so as to provide real-time peer to peer communication time [11]. The combination of the AES algorithm with the PRNG (Pseudorandom Number Generator) chaos system provides advantages in terms of the size of data that can be processed and the best key acquisition in securing medical image data. FPGA (Field Programmable Gate Array) devices are an option because circuitry is possible for specific algorithms as well as being dynamically programmable [12].

The AES algorithm is available in several programming language libraries and one of them is java which will be implemented in this research. In addition, the development does not only use the pure AES cryptography method, but also combined using the CBC (Cipher Block Chaining) block cipher technique, this will strengthen the system with the use of two security key parameters and initialization vector. So in this research cryptography will be applied using the java programming language with the output of android mobile applications with the AES-256 encryption algorithm.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

In completing this research, the author uses a method to design systematic system development, while the method used is the waterfall model. The waterfall model emphasises a system development scheme in an orderly and sequential manner at each stage, starting from initial identification to the testing or maintenance stage [13]. The waterfall model used in the system development process in this study can be seen in Figure 1 below.



A. Literature Review

The first stage in this research and its relationship to system development is a literature study, this stage is carried out by analysing and studying previously existing related research such as in journal media, proceedings, books, and other publication media. The results at this stage can be seen in the literature review in the previous chapter which explains the process and results achieved by previous researchers.

B. Method and Algorithm Analysis

In the previous chapter it was explained that cryptography methods can be broadly divided into two, namely based on symmetric and asymmetric keys. In this research, AES is included in symmetric cryptography so that both the same key will be used in the encryption process and the decryption process of a data. The AES algorithm is a type of symmetric block ciphertext algorithm in which it has a key length variation which is divided into 3 namely 128-bit, 192-bit, and 256-bit. The key length will determine the number of rounds that will be carried out in the encryption and decryption process, as for the key length and other information can be seen in table 1 below.

After several processes have been carried out, the next stage is the main stage in the encryption process using the AES Algorithm, this stage is divided into four parts, namely sub bytes, shift rows, mix columns, and add arround key.

a. Sub Bytes

Is a transformation process by utilising the S-Box (Substitution Box) table, this table is an indexing-based tool for the efficiency of the block cipher algorithm substitution process [14], as for the transformation results as follows.



The completion is adjusted to the round used based on the length of the AES key, because only as an example, the calculation only reaches the round 0 stage. To do the decryption process, it is done with the inverse transformation of all previous transformations.

e. CBC Method

The AES algorithm is one type of block cipher cryptography algorithm where in this type of cryptography there are several advanced methods or modes for security and one of them is CBC (Cipher Block Chaining). In its flow the CBC method performs the encryption process with the initialization vector parameter in its first block. Parameter IV operates the OR logic gate which will perform the XOR advanced logic operation on the next plaintext, the encryption data is generated using the process to produce the first ciphertext block. so that the new plaintext block only performs the XOR operation with the previous ciphertext output, the inverse function will be used in the next decryption stage, and the plaintext is generated. So that it can be said that this encryption mechanism is like a chain that is related to each other in each block. [15]. The use of the CBC method can provide advantages from the security aspect, where each IV will be different in each encryption session with the same key that will produce different ciphertexts., as for how the CBC method works as in the following figure 12.



In this method originally developed in 1976 [16] known operations using XOR bolean logic as described earlier so that the basic mathematical calculation of the CBC method is as in equation 8 below.



C. System Design and Drafting

In the research conducted by the author in relation to the development of the application system, the author uses DFD (Data Flow Diagram) which in its implementation is displayed in two parts, namely the message encryption and message decryption processes.


a. DFD of Encryption Process

The sender enters the original image message or plaintext and goes through the encryption process into ciphertext which then continues the contact authentication process to find out the purpose of sending the chat message. Then for the process of sending messages and receiving them as ciphertext, decryption is carried out first before displaying, and more details can be seen in Figure 13 below.



b. DFD of Decryption Process

The following is a process that describes the reception of messages between teachers and students and vice versa up to the stage of message reading. It contains three processes that can be explained in more detail. Message reception begins. The message data sent as an encrypted message is decrypted by the system and displayed to the message recipient as a normal message, and you can see more details in Figure 14 below.





In the implementation stage, a system will be developed to secure chat messages used in the counseling procession. The type or type of message that is the main focus in this research is the type of image or image, besides that the cryptographic method using the AES-256 algorithm is not only used independently but will also be combined using the CBC method. The developed application system produces an android mobile application output by utilizing the Backend As a Service service in the form of a Firebase database with three main types of storage, namely realtime and storage, with firebase authentication as an authentication API for every user who registers or enters the system. Thus the system will use the End-to-End User principle so that both sending or receiving parties only see plaintext data during counseling sessions. The flow of system implementation can be seen in Figure 15 below.

E. System Testing

At this stage, testing of the application system that has been developed will be carried out, while the testing method that will be used is the blackbox testing method to test the functional structure of the encryption and decryption system. In addition to the blackbox approach, other tests will be carried out using brute force attacks to determine the resilience of the application system in the security domain. And especially to test the ability to hack the keys used in the encryption process.

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

At this stage the process of securing counseling messages using the AES-256 algorithm and the CBC method will be explained in two stages, namely the encryption and decryption processes. Then proceed with the results of the implementation of the application that has been developed for the final stage tested with two test parameters.

A. Flow of Encryption Code

In the encryption process, the author uses three main functions in the script code logic, namely *generateSecretKeySpec()* to generate AES keys with a size of 32-byte randomly. Next is *encrypt()* whose role is to retrieve data, keys, and iv as a condition for performing AES encryption with a combination of CBC. The last function is *uploadTask(Bitmap bitmap)* whose role is to upload the encrypted image message data to the firebase BaaS service.

B. Flow of Decryption Code

In the decryption process, the author uses three main functions in the script code logic, namely generateSecretKeySpec(byte[] aesKey) to generate objects and hold the AES key. Next decrypt(byte[] encryptedData, byte[] aesKey, byte[] iv) whose role is to decrypt using the AES key and iv used in the previous encryption process. And the last function *decryptAndDisplayImage(String encryptedDataURL, final ImageView imageView, final byte[] aesKey, final byte[] iv)* which has the role of downloading the encrypted image and decrypting it before displaying it again.




Fig 20. Interface Reset Password Page




Fig 21. Interface Dashboard




Fig 22. Interface Chat Room




Fig 25. Second Encrypted Image Message (.jpg)




Fig 27. Second Encryption Value File (.jpg)

Based on the tests in Table 3, the results obtained show that the tested system functionality can run well. Testing is



done with several scenarios on the main functionality of the application system developed.

Based on Table 4, the results of system robustness testing are obtained using the brute force attack test. The test case is done by trying all possible AES key lengths and counting the number of possible keys. because the number of possible keys is very large, it is written in scientific notation. Despite finding the number of possible keys, it failed to find a valid key for the encryption process.

IV. CONCLUSION

The conclusion obtained from this research is the application of a combination of the AES 256 algorithm and the CBC method on the BaaS service security system in the chat counseling application can run well. Combining these two methods produces stronger encrypted data because the use of initialization vectors and message authentication are additional security parameters. In addition, based on testing conducted with the blackbox method, it shows that the system functionality has worked properly and in accordance with their respective parameters. Testing the system against brute force attacks also shows strong resistance, so that valid keys cannot be guessed. Further research development can further include the use of double encryption on encrypted data to increase system data security and reduce the risk of data leakage.

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Comparison of ANN Backpropagation Algorithm and Random Forest Regression in Predicting the Number of New Students

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Abstract – Higher education institutions are educational units located at a higher level after high school or vocational school. Catholic University Darma Cendika Surabaya (UKDC) faces challenges in managing the admission of new students due to variations in the number of prospective students applying to each department, which is also influenced by changing trends in interests and job needs in Indonesia. The use of Artificial Neural Network with Backpropagation and Random Forest Regression algorithms for comparing the prediction of new student admissions in the following year will be beneficial for the administration of Catholic University Darma Cendika Surabaya (UKDC) to gain a clearer understanding of the dynamics of admissions and to support decision making in the future development of the university. The predicted number of students joining Catholic University Darma Cendika Surabaya (UKDC) in the 2024 period using Artificial Neural Network is 219 students with a Mean Squared Error (MSE) of 0,1046 and Root Mean Square Error (RMSE) of 0,32.

Keywords – Artificial Neural Network, Backpropagation, Random Forest Regression, MSE, RMSE.

I. INTRODUCTION

In a university there are three important roles in its implementation, namely: carry out education, carry out research, and carry out community service [1]. The new student admission process is the starting point of the University in forming a diverse academic community and has the potential to develop their interests and ambitions, this is a key aspect of higher education administration that will affect the continuation and academic development of the University [2]. Darma Cendika Catholic University (UKDC) has a variety of variations in new student admissions each year such as the number of prospective new students who register in each department, this must be considered so that new student admissions can increase the following year. Darma Cendika Catholic University can prepare by predicting the number of students who will register in the following year by predicting it. In this study, researchers predicted new students in the following year using the Artificial Neural Network and Random Forest Regression algorithms using historical data on student admissions from 2017-2023.

Artificial Neural Network (ANN) is an information processing system that can produce predictive values from data with high accuracy using artificial neural networks that model complex relationships between inputs and outputs so that they resemble the characteristics of human nerves. ANN is also able to identify patterns in data when processing large datasets [3]. Meanwhile, Random Forest Regression is a regression learning algorithm used to produce predictive values more strongly and accurately than a single model. Random Forest Regression is suitable for solving various types of problems [4].

Previous research has illustrated the progress of the use of Artificial Neural Network (ANN) application in designing optimization of rice production prediction using multilayer [5], application in predicting nickel ore production [6], use in predicting rainfall [7], use in predicting student graduation predicate [3], use in predicting stock prices [8] and Random Forest Regression use in predicting the number of class participants for schedule planning [4], use in predicting house prices [9], use in predicting coffee quality [10], use in predicting Ciliwung river water quality [11], use in predicting cell phone prices [12] for different algorithm applications. However, each researcher has various tests, at this time there is still no one who uses Artificial Neural Network and Random Forest Regression models as a comparison to predict the number of new students at Darma Cendika Catholic University Surabaya which is a research factor with a different context.

In this research, we aim to achieve a more accurate and relevant prediction comparison with our university situation. The purpose of this research is to provide predictions using Artificial Neural Network and Random Forest Regression that are useful for the administration of Darma Cendika Catholic University Surabaya to provide a clearer view of the dynamics of enrollment in support of decision making on the future development of the university.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

In this research, the process began with the collection of a dataset. For gathering data on new students, we requested information from the admission office of Darma Cendika Catholic University in Surabaya. Subsequently, we




Fig 1. Flowchart of the Research Process.

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conducted data cleaning to remove unnecessary information, ensuring that the resulting data would yield optimal results. After the data cleaning process, we proceeded to implement the data into the prediction program we had developed. The process flow is depicted in Figure 1.

- 1. Problem Identification Problem identification is crucial for formulating the research focus. The identified issues include:
- Accessibility of data collection through the administration of New Student Admissions.
- Quality of the provided data.
- Variables influencing the data results.
- Data Collection
 Data collection involved obtaining the dataset for new student admissions from 2017 to 2023 through the UKDC administration.

3. Data Cleaning

Data cleaning involves making changes to the dataset, addressing issues such as handling missing data, ensuring data consistency, and other necessary adjustments. This step is crucial during the data preparation process, allowing the transformation of data into a model dataset ready for analysis and comprehensible to the researcher [6].

4. Data Preparation

In this study, a division of 80-20 is employed, with 80% as the training dataset and 20% as the test data. Subsequently, data normalization and scaling are performed to ensure that the data has a suitable range and characteristics, aiming to enhance accuracy and reduce the potential for data leakage [13].

 Student Prediction Process The prediction of the number of new students involves the application of Artificial Neural Network and Random Forest Regression through several stages of the process.

6. Prediction

Prediction is an effort or action in which someone anticipates or estimates something in the future by utilizing relevant information from previous periods [4].

7. Artificial Neural Network

Artificial Neural Network is a data classification model that shares a concept almost similar to the human brain's neural system. The goal of an Artificial Neural Network is to enable a computer to have cognitive thinking abilities, mimicking the way the human brain operates to solve problems [3][13].

8. Backpropagation



Backpropagation, developed by Rumelhart, Hinton, and Williams around 1986, resulted in an iterative algorithm that is considered simple and easy to use [14][15]. Backpropagation is a method in artificial neural networks that uses supervised learning algorithms. It involves multiple perceptrons with many layers used to adjust weight values in hidden layers [15].

9. Random Forest Regression

Random Forest Regression is a machine learning technique that combines predictions from various algorithms to generate a random forest regression. It produces an average result from hundreds to thousands of decision trees consisting of decision nodes and leaf nodes used for sample evaluation through its test function [4].

10. MSE and RMSE

Mean Squared Error (MSE) and Root Mean Squared Error (RMSE) are methods for measuring how far the predictions of a model are from the actual data. They provide an indication of the standard deviation of the difference between predicted and observed values, yielding optimal predictive recommendations [16][17].

- 11. Implementation

This research utilizes Google Colab as the text editor provided by Google. Google Colab is based on the Python programming language and is designed to be accessible online, allowing researchers to develop and build Artificial Neural Network (ANN) models for predictions more conveniently and efficiently.

The researcher implemented the Artificial Neural Network (ANN) model using the KERAS library from TensorFlow. The model consists of an input layer, 14 hidden layers, and an output layer. For the Random Forest Regressor model, the researcher used the Scikit-Learn library, which employs a tree-based algorithm suitable for regression data.

12. Measurement of Error Rate

After implementation, the process involves measuring the average error rate

using Mean Squared Error (MSE) and Root Mean Squared Error (RMSE) [18]. These metrics provide insights into the accuracy of the prediction models, with lower values indicating better performance by minimizing the differences between predicted and actual values.

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

3.1 Data Cleaning

The following Tables 2, 3, 4 present the results after the data cleaning process and grouping of the initial dataset. Table 2. Total data of new student admissions





Fig 3. Correlation Matrix among Data.

Conducting a test by setting the parameter for 2023 as the prediction target involves creating a new CSV file by excluding data from the year 2023.





Fig 5. Prediction of New Students in 2023 using ANN.

Analysis of the predicted number of new student admissions for the year 2023 using ANN:

- 1. In the prediction section, the estimated number of new student admissions expected to join Darma Cendika Catholic University (UKDC) in 2023 is approximately 221.31 or 221 students.
- 2. The model produces an MSE value of around 0.116, indicating a low level of prediction error in the Artificial Neural Network model.
- 3. The RMSE value is approximately 0.34, signifying that the predictions are close to the actual data.

Comparing the predicted results with the actual data, there is a difference of around 4.74%, with the predicted value being slightly higher than the actual data (211 to 221 in the prediction results).



Analysis Results of Predicting the Number of New Students in 2023 using Random Forest Regressor:

In the prediction section, the estimated number of new student admissions expected to join Darma Cendika Catholic University (UKDC) in 2023 is approximately 212.21 or 212 students.

- 1. The model produces an MSE value of around 0.3651, indicating a low level of prediction error in the Random Forest Regressor model.
- 2. The RMSE value is approximately 0.60, signifying that the predictions are close to the actual data.
- 3. Comparing the predicted results with the actual data, there is a difference of around 0.47%, with the predicted value being slightly higher than the actual data (211 to 212 in the prediction results).

Further testing will be conducted with datasets from 2017 to 2023, followed by predictions for new student admissions in 2024. Figure 4 represents the graphical results of predicting new student admissions in 2024.




Fig 7 Prediction of New Students in 2024 using ANN.

These results suggest that the Artificial Neural Network model provides accurate predictions for the number of new student admissions in 2024.




Fig 8. Prediction of New Students in 2024 using Random Forest Regressor.

Analysis Results of Predicting the Number of New Students in 2024 using Random Forest Regressor:

- In the prediction section, the estimated number of new student admissions expected to join Darma Cendika Catholic University (UKDC) in 2024 is approximately 213.23 or 213 students.
- 2. The model produces an MSE value of around 0.3963, indicating a low level of prediction error in the Random Forest Regressor model.
- 3. The RMSE value is approximately 0.63, signifying that the predictions are close to the actual data.

These results suggest that the Random Forest Regressor model provides accurate predictions for the number of new student admissions in 2024.

IV. CONCLUSION

From the analysis results, it can be concluded that the Artificial Neural Network (ANN) model provides a more accurate prediction of the number of new student admissions for the year 2024, estimating 219 students compared to the Random Forest Regressor's estimate of 213 students. The ANN model exhibits a lower prediction error rate with an MSE value of approximately 0.1046 and better prediction accuracy with an RMSE value of around 0.32, compared to the Random Forest Regressor model. However, the difference in error values being higher in the ANN model compared to the Random Forest Regressor with a lower error rate can be attributed to several factors:

1. The dataset has limited data that influences the model's performance, especially the ANN model, which requires a substantial amount of data for effective training.

2. The ANN model is more complex than the Random Forest Regressor, potentially leading to overfitting, whereas the Random Forest Regressor demonstrates robustness due to its use of multiple trees from random subsets.

In this study, it can be concluded that the Artificial Neural Network (ANN) model provides a more accurate prediction of the number of new student admissions for 2024, estimating around 219 students, compared to the Random Forest Regressor model, which predicts approximately 213 students. The ANN model has a lower prediction error rate, as indicated by an MSE value of around 0.1046, and better prediction accuracy, with an RMSE of around 0.32, compared to the Random Forest Regressor model. However, despite the ANN model providing more accurate predictions and having a lower error rate, the possibility of errors cannot be ruled out due to the relatively small amount of data. Thus, the results of this prediction study can provide support for university administration and development in the future.

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Mobile Based Application Design of the Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa Using the Waterfall Method

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Abstract - The church is a gathering place for Christians to carry out worship. The Sumbawa Redeemer Catholic Church is a church that originates from Sumbawa Besar Regency, West Nusa Tenggara Province. This Catholic Church is the only church in Sumbawa Regency. The purpose of this research is to make the Application of the Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa. using the waterfall design method and the ADDIE model. The data collection method was carried out using the Unified Modeling Language (UML) method, use cases and activity diagrams ere used as analysis and design tools. The programming languages used include Kotlin and Java, the software used includes the IDE Android Studio 4.0, MS. This research yielded results, namely a program that can be used to make it easier for people to find information about the Sumbawa Redeemer Catholic Church.

I. INTRODUCTION

In the current era of globalization, technological developments are increasingly widespread in their use [1]. With so many technologies, it can make it easier for users to access internet information [2]. In everyday life, users always use the internet as one of the information media and can be accessed through websites or applications. Technology is currently able to provide better services in various circles of society so as to make it easier for people to access information media [3]. With the development of technology, there are problems in various circles of society, for example among the church[4]. There are some churches that have not used information media systems in the form of web or applications, so it can be difficult for church people to get information.

The Catholic Church is a whole and universal church, encompassing all those united in the bond of baptism[5]. The Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa is one of the catholic churches in the middle of the city center. The Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa is located on Jalan Diponegoro, West Nusa Tenggara Province, Sumbawa Regency, Sumbawa Besar District, Uma Sima Village[6]. The Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa has been established since November 24, 1990 which has a population of 2311 people and some of its people come from overseas and The Catholic Church of the Redeemer of students. Sumbawa is still difficult in managing the information media system, because the information media system of the Catholic Church of the Redeemer of Sumbawa is still running smoothly. manual, which is the delivery of information through readings that can be obtained during the celebration of the Eucharist [7]. If there are some people who are not present at the Eucharist celebration on Sunday, they cannot get information[8]. The management of people's data is still done manually, so to find out these data, you have to find back the people's data files that

have been stored[9]. Some devotions are still done manually, that is , they are done by reading daily devotions at morning worship. Thus, a solution is needed to help the catholic church of the redeemer of Sumbawa in the information media system so that it cannot facilitate church people in use information media provided by the church[10].

From these problems, research was conducted to design a church information media system, so that it could help manage information data in church services [11]. The information media system that will be built has several features, namely church scheduling, church devotional, community data collection, and church information. The scheduling feature will discuss the schedule of the Eucharistic celebration and the tasks in charge of the Eucharistic celebration, the devotional feature will discuss several daily devotions each day, the church community data collection feature will discuss the data on the names of church members who have been registered in the Sumbawa redeemer catholic church and the information feature will discuss information important church. The information media system to be built is in the form of an application. The application to be built is based on Android and uses the Kotlin programming language. The application to be built uses a database in the form of firebase[12].

Android Studio is an Integrated Development Environment (IDE) software used to develop android applications[13]. Android Studio first appeared in 2013 and began to be released in June 20 14, the stable version was released in December 2014, while the stable version was released in May 2020 . Android Studio is the official software supported by Google. Android Studio provides an interface for creating and managing management apps. For programming language used is kotlin. Android Studio has the advantage of giving access to the Android Software Development Kit (SDK).

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Website is a collection of digital pages that contain information in the form of text, images, videos, or a combination that has been connected to the internet [14]. The website can be seen or accessed by various circles of society. There are several web programming languages used namely html, php, css, and javascript. The website first appeared in the world in 1991 and was inaugurated on April 30, 1993 which can be used for free by the public. The website is very important in various circles of society, because that way, many information media can be accessed through the website.

Firebase is an app development platform to simplify the work of mobile developers[15]. With Firebase, developers can focus more on developing applications. Firebase was first established in 2011, the first platform to be developed is the realtime database. Realtime database is useful to help developers store and synchronize data to many users. There are several features that can be used by users such as firebase analytics, firebase cloud messaging, notifications, firebase a uthentications, firebase remote config, firebase realtime database, and firebase crash reporting.

Kotlin is a programming language that is often used by developers and is based on open source[16]. Kotlin development has been carried out since 2010, in 2012 Kotlin became open source. Kotlin is one of the programming languages that are in great demand by developers, because it can overcome null, concise, no runtime overhead, a large community, and is flexible.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

2.1 Metode SDLC (System Development Life Cycle)

In this study, researchers used the SDLC (Software Development Life Cycle) method. Software Development Life Cycle (SDLC) is a method used to design and develop a system. 


Fig1. Waterfall model stages

2.2.5 Management

The last stage of the *waterfall* model is the management stage. System management serves to find out which systems are not detected during the testing phase. At this stage, improvements are also made to the software such as features and user needs.



III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

This section is a section that discusses the implementation of the SDLC method with a waterfall model in the Mobile-Based Sumbawa Redeemer Catholic Church Application Design Using the Waterfall Method.

3.1 Analysis

At this stage, the analysis and data collection used is using observation and interview methods. Information data can be found through books, journals, and literature on the internet. Data collection is carried out based on user needs and system needs. Data collection aims to identify what needs are used in application design and development. a. The input given by the user, to login via Android smartphone is username, email, for login purposes and for registration, the user fills out several forms, namely name, email, mobile number, and password.

b. The input given by the admin, to login via Android smartphone is email, filled with the registered email and password, filled with the registered password.

2. Output Requirement (Output)

Output needs analysis is the process of designing and developing the Android-based Sumbawa Redeemer Catholic Church application using the Waterfall method. These needs include hardware needs and software needs. The required devices are Android Studio, Kotlin, Firebase, while for hardware needs, namely laptops, smartphones, and data cables.

3.2 Planning

Unified Modelling Language (UML) is a system design carried out to describe the flow of relationships between users and applications. The system design used to explain how the application works is the *Use case* Diagram and *Activity Diagram*.

a. Use Case Diagram

Use case Diagram is an interaction between the system and the user. In the picture below there is an admin who can manage data, then the admin can input data , edit data and delete data[20]. Then for users can access the features available in the system, following the system workflow Use case Diagram.




Fig 2. Use Case Admin Diagram





Fig 3. Use Case Diagram User

Activity Diagram is a depiction of the workflow of an application system that is interrelated on the system, along with an activity *diagram* image.








Fig 5. Activity Diagram User

3.4 Testing

Based on Table 3 test results using *Black Box* testing, get good results. The entire system has been tested and no system errors were found. All units tested are in accordance with previous analyses. Overall the system can run well and display reactions according to the user's wishes.

Testing with the *User Acceptance* method gets a fairly high score. The results of this test will be calculated to get the final value of user satisfaction with the application that has been designed. The calculation isdone using the following formula (1):

In the scheduling feature contains about the schedule and church officials at the Eucharistic celebration, the devotional feature contains daily devotions such as Bible verses, the feature Information contains images, videos, news and other posts, the Church Community Data Collection feature contains a data collection form for people who have just joined in parish of the catholic church of the redeemer of Sumbawa. Researchers also provide testing of users, so that users can make an assessment of the application. 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Detection of Hate-Speech Tweets Based on Deep Learning: A Review

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Abstract – Cybercrime, cyberbullying, and hate speech have all increased in conjunction with the use of the internet and social media. The scope of hate speech knows no bounds or organizational or individual boundaries. This disorder affects many people in diverse ways. It can be harsh, offensive, or discriminating depending on the target's gender, race, political opinions, religious intolerance, nationality, human color, disability, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or status as an immigrant. Authorities and academics are investigating new methods for identifying hate speech on social media platforms like Facebook and Twitter. This study adds to the ongoing discussion about creating safer digital spaces while balancing limiting hate speech and protecting freedom of speech. Partnerships between researchers, platform developers, and communities are crucial in creating efficient and ethical content moderation systems on Twitter and other social media sites. For this reason, multiple methodologies, models, and algorithms are employed. This study presents a thorough analysis of hate speech in numerous research publications. Each article has been thoroughly examined, including evaluating the algorithms or methodologies used, databases, classification techniques, and the findings achieved. In addition, comprehensive discussions were held on all the examined papers, explicitly focusing on consuming deep learning techniques to detect hate speech.

I. INTRODUCTION

Online social media enables the spread of humanities to be associated. However, one disadvantage of these social media is the ability to publish and propagate malicious and harmful content [1]. Hate speech seeks to promote violence and incite hostility against individuals or groups based on characteristics-such as sexual orientation/gender identity, religion, disability, gender, age, veteran status, or age, gender, or disability. The increasing number of social media platforms has caused matters to be excessive [2]. Not all substances are pertinent; some may cause damage to individuals, which is a disgraceful indictment when those who use the media to spread hatred [3]. Hate speech affects everyone regardless of age, which might be too young, an adult, or an older adult [4]. Individuals use a lot of social media platforms daily to express their thoughts, emotions, and progress. Usually, the comments are more hate speech than positive comments, which leads to different kinds of problems; for that reason, it is essential to select a method to detect the words, analyze them, and then show the result of accuracy [5]. Deep learning utilizes networks that have multiple layers [6]. This allows them to understand patterns and representations in data by learning from examples [7]. The training process involves providing these networks with amounts of labeled data, enabling the system to adjust its parameters until it can accurately predict or classify information [8]. This ability makes deep learning especially effective for tasks that involve decision-making and pattern recognition. Deep understanding encompasses such architectures tailored for specific tasks, each designed to address the unique challenges of different data types [9]. Artificial neural networks, inspired by biological neurons, serve as the foundational components of deep learning, replicating the core elements of human intellect [10]. These networks, which have several layers of nodes, have led to many architectures, each specialized for distinct tasks and applications. Convolutional Neural Networks (CNN) excel in analyzing videos and photos, Recurrent Neural Networks (RNN) are adept at addressing issues related to sequential data, and Generative Adversarial Networks (GAN) are at the forefront of generating synthetic data that closely mimics accurate data. [11], [12]. Hate speech detection in social media Twitter is detecting and defining all the cyberbullying an individual can receive on their regular posts [13]. The hate speech might be on racism, sexuality, child abuse, Politicians, and many others. Detecting hate speech is difficult because its nature and context-specific attributes frequently characterize it [14], [15]. Conventional rule-based or keyword-based methods may face problems in accurately identifying the subtleties of hate speech, as hate speech can take on different forms, such as indirect language, changing slang, or statements that depend on the context [16]. Hate speech detection utilizes deep learning, specifically natural language processing algorithms [17]. This paper aims to review other works on detecting hate speech in social media using different types of deep learning methods. The rest of this paper is organized to describe the background theory of deep learning and the algorithms to detect hate speech on Twitter platforms. After that, in section 2, different research on using CNN and GRU, CNN, and LSTM to detect hate speech on social media are described and compared in Table 1 and Table 2. Finally, section 3 describes a discussion session, a conclusion and limitations, and a list of references are shown.

II. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

Detecting hate speech in social media requires datasets and an algorithm to learn and extract the comments to be analyzed [18]. For that reason, researchers are using deep learning algorithms to detect hate speech. Deep Learning, a subset of machine learning, aims to replicate the brain's function for analyzing and processing data [15]. At its core, Learning utilizes networks of intricate structures made up




Fig 1. Classification of deep learning techniques, <u>https://www.researchgate.net</u>

of interconnected nodes to model and interpret complex patterns within large datasets. What makes deep learning understandable is its ability to learn representations of data automatically [19], enabling it to identify features and relationships that may pose challenges for conventional machine learning methods [20]. This technology has shown achievements in file recognition, speech processing, natural language understanding, and autonomous systems [21], [22]. The continuous progress in deep learning algorithms alone and the availability of computing resources have paved the way for advancements in artificial intelligence[23]. These advancements shape technology and impact domains like healthcare, finance, and selfdriving vehicles. This technology has shown achievements in file recognition, speech processing, natural language understanding, and autonomous systems[24] [20]. The continuous progress in deep learning algorithms alone and the availability of computing resources have paved the way for advancements in artificial intelligence [25], [26]. These advancements shape technology and impact domains like healthcare, finance, and self-driving vehicles. The Advances in learning models, such as (CNNs) for image processing and (RNNs) for sequential data, have resulted in substantial changes in domains such as machine vision, natural language processing, and recognition of words[8]. Deep Learning is executed by neural networks, which consist of multiple layers, a concept that is not novel [27], [28]. Nevertheless, its popularity has surged recently, driven mainly by three factors: Firstly, there has been a significant enhancement in processing capabilities, such as video cards and graphical processors. Secondly, the availability of affordable computer hardware has played a crucial role. Lastly, recent advancements and breakthroughs in Deep Learning research have also contributed to its rise. Deep learning algorithms can be categorized into three groupings based on whether the algorithms are trained to produce achievable results. The subgroups are unsupervised, supervised, and hybrid [27]. The reliability of each deep learning algorithm is demonstrated in Figure. 1.

A. Convolutional Neural Networks (CNN) and Gated Recurrent Units (GRU) for Detecting Hate Speech:

Due to its potentially devastating effects on society, identifying instances of hate speech in digital communications is a significant difficulty [29]. One viable strategy for this problem is to use cutting-edge technologies like (CNNs). Combining (CNNs) and (GRUs) offers a powerful technique for detecting hate speech, harnessing the benefits of both architectures [14]. While CNNs are great at comprehending short-term dependencies in sequences, (GRUs) excel at understanding long-term dependencies [30]. In this combined method, textual information is tokenized and processed, then supplied into an embedding layer, as shown in Figure 2 [31]. It covers identifying hate speech on social media, particularly Twitter and provides a convolution-GRU-based deep neural network solution [32]. The authors address hate speech identification features such as a bag of words, word and character n-grams, sentiment analysis, linguistic resources, and standard and deep learning methods [33]. The authors also noted a need for comparable evaluation and limited public hate speech datasets.

The CNN's convolutional layers then process the embedded sequences to pull out abstract patterns and features at various levels of granularity [34]. The (GRU) then uses these traits to learn to record sequential and contextual information, drawing connections between previously unrelated parts of the text [22]. The (GRU)'s gated structure allows for the storage and updating of data, which aids in the nuanced understanding of the text's context and the detection of hate speech [35]. Training a mixed model requires iteratively adjusting parameters to achieve a target loss function minimization. To better detect hate speech, the model combines (CNNs) for feature extraction with GRU for sequence modeling [10]. The model's performance and robustness in identifying hate speech across online content can be improved by fine-tuning, optimizing, and studying other architectures and hyperparameters. There are negative impacts on humans' mental and physical health as a direct result of the rapid growth of social media mediums and the constant use by their users. To guard against and avoid any mishaps that might take place behind the scenes on social media platforms, hate speech has become one of the most hazardous subjects to discuss. Researchers turned to deep learning strategies, which will be covered in more detail in the following paragraphs, to identify instances of hate speech on social media sites like Twitter [36], [37] proposed method utilizes a deep learning ensemble approach that combines multiple sub-models to improve classification performance. The paper also mentions the use of a publicly available embedding model. As for the number of datasets used, the article does not provide a specific number. However, the authors mention using the SemEval dataset to compare findings and a split set with an 85/15 ratio for testing purposes. Regarding the results, the paper reports a 5-point improvement in F-measure compared to previous work. The ensemble approach also showed a reduction in variance compared to individual models. [37]discusses a new method for detecting hate speech on Twitter using a Convolution-(GRU)-based deep neural network. The proposed method outperforms previous methods on 6 out of 7 datasets by between 1 and 13% in F1. The comparison was made against several baselines and state-of-the-art on the most extensive publicly available Twitter datasets. The paper also



discusses the implementation, parameter tuning, and evaluation metrics used in the study. [38]systematically analyze hate speech in 9 languages and offer a low-resource detection approach. They test CNN-GRU, BERT, and LASER embedding with logistic regression to detect hate speech in different languages under different scenarios. The authors also present a portfolio of effective models for each language based on data availability. The research sheds light on the difficulties of detecting hate speech in languages other than English and suggests a low-resource detection approach. In [39] they used CNN and GRU algorithms to detect hate speech. CNN is better for local features, and GRU is better for long-range context dependencies. LSTM, another RNN, is slower and more likely to overfit small datasets than GRU. Both models have pros and cons, and hyperparameter adjustment affects performance. [40] suggests utilizing deep neural networks to detect internet hate speech. According to the authors, automatic identification is needed due to digital communication and online hostility. They propose multiclass classification using fastText, BERT embeddings, SVM, and deep neural network classifiers. They find encouraging results using their method on numerous datasets. [41] Combining GRU, ELMo, BERT, and CNN data improves classification performance. The proposed approach has good accuracy and F1 score, making it a feasible option for social media hate speech. However, the approach's success may depend on the training data's quality and representativeness and the classifiers and fusion methods used. [9]discusses a model for detecting hate speech on Twitter using CNN and character-level representation. The authors present their approach to building and cleaning datasets, as well as the architecture of their model. They also discuss related work in sentiment analysis and hate speech detection. The results of their experiments were presented and discussed, with the model achieving satisfactory accuracy compared to the state-ofthe-art. [42] highlight various hate speech detection research using these neural network topologies. Zimmerman et al. represented 50 tokens using CNN parameters, while Founta et al. offered a two-layer RNN model using GRU and metadata on people, networks, and content. Some hate speech detection investigations have used hybrid CNN and RNN models, which perform better than either architecture alone. The research thoroughly analyzes CNN and GRU in hate speech detection and shows their potential to improve model accuracy. [43] discusses a study that classified Bengali Facebook comments as Hate Speech, Communal Attacks, Incitement, Religious Hatred, Political Comments, and Religious Comments using (GRU). The study presented an annotated Bengali corpus of six-class comments. The experiment indicates that a GRU-based classification model can achieve 70.10% accuracy. The article found that the BiLSTM performed best with a weighted classification F1 score of 91%. In[36], to identify harmful remarks in virtual communities and social media platforms. The algorithm employs pre-trained word embeddings and many channels to forecast multilabel toxicity indicators precisely. The report additionally examines pertinent literature, outlines the structure of the suggested model, and presents the

findings of its evaluation. Moreover, in [37], the research paper discussed the use of deep neural network (DNN) architectures, including (CNN), (GRU), and Universal Language Model Fine-tuning (ULMFiT), for the classification of hate speech in tweets. It highlights the advantages of using DNN models for hate speech detection and emphasizes the superior performance of the ULMFiT model over other architectures. The ULMFiT model, based on the three-layered Average-SGD Weight-Dropped Long Short-Term Memory (AWD-LSTM) architecture. demonstrates substantial improvements in accuracy and F1 score. After that, in [46]. It outlines the method used in the study, which involves transforming speech signals from the time domain to the frequency domain, extracting features using mel-frequency cepstral coefficients, and using a CNN-GRU model to detect and classify dysarthria patients and healthy people. The article also mentions the prevalence of dysarthria in patients with neurological diseases and the potential applications of this technology in healthcare. [47] Investigates the frequency of hate speech on Twitter amidst the COVID-19 outbreak. The study uses machine learning algorithms to discern and examine the data to ascertain patterns and trends within hate speech. The results indicate that there was a significant presence of hate speech about COVID-19 on Twitter during the pandemic, with specific demographics being disproportionately targeted. The authors propose that their discoveries can be employed to counteract hate speech and foster inclusiveness on social media sites. The researcher in [29]Worked on A comprehensive analysis of scholarly research on the identification of hate speech in social media, particularly on Twitter, using the utilization of neural networks. The review comprises a subset of 20 studies from a pool of 565 distinct works, chosen according to specific inclusion and exclusion criteria and the study's primary and secondary inquiries. The review examines the models, algorithms, and methodologies employed in these investigations and the datasets, languages, and nations implicated. The review reveals that the predominant models used are based on Convolutional Neural Networks (CNNs). While these models offer certain advantages over recent models in detecting hate speech, they also exhibit limitations and deficiencies. These include challenges in automated hate speech detection, compatibility with specific languages only, and ambiguity in speech classification when applied to datasets in different languages. The review presents a thorough overview of the experimental particulars and findings of the incorporated investigations, encompassing F1 score, recall, precision, and accuracy. In [48], The authors address the issue of vocabulary mismatch in tweets by using feature expansion to build a corpus of similarity. The study uses four deep learning methods: Convolutional Neural Network (CNN), Gated Recurrent Unit (GRU), and a combination of the CNN-GRU and GRU-CNN classifications with Boolean representation as feature extraction. The experiment was carried out to find the best performance by comparing the value of the accuracy. The accuracy results were obtained from the average of the five tests in each scenario.

B. Convolutional Neural Networks (CNN) and Long Short-Term Memory (LSTM) for Detecting Hate Speech:

CNNs allow for fast processing of text data, extracting linguistic features and patterns that can be used to identify hate speech from other types of expression [49], [50]. Embeddings, convolution, pooling, and dense connections are just some of the layers that can train CNN models to recognize the linguistic and contextual cues indicative of hate speech. [51]addresses the difficulties of identifying hate speech on social media and the strategies that have proven successful in doing so. When evaluating the precision of various machine learning and deep learning approaches, the authors find that BiRNN (Bidirectional Recurrent Neural Network) excels. [52]Each time step, the LSTM neural network processes one word embedding from a multilayer perceptron (MLP) with two hidden layers, keeping word order. LSTM neural network output is processed via hyperbolic tangent activation. The number of terms must be specified before training the recurrent neural network. HaterNet detected at most 33 terms after preprocessing the tagged corpus tweets. All tweets under 33 terms have padding rows of 0s. In. After that, [53]benefits from identifying risky comments using LSTM neural networks. The authors cleaned data with NLTK and built their own stop words. The model had great precision, recall, and accuracy. The paper tries to filter hate speech and make social media safer. [54] Presents a comprehensive approach to detecting hate speech on Twitter using traditional machine and deep learning techniques. The authors explore shallow learning algorithms, including logistic regression, random forest, decision tree, naïve Bayes, K-NN, SVM, and deep learning methods such as LSTM, BiLSTM, and CNN. Further examines the difficulties linked to detecting hate speech on social media platforms. It provides insights into potential applications of the proposed approach for mitigating the impact of hate speech on individuals and communities. On the road to realizing their full potential, these models are trained extensively using labeled datasets and then fine-tuned [55]. Aside from helping with automatic identification, using this model for hate speech

detection allows for prompt interventions and mitigation methods, making the internet safer for everyone. CNNs and (LSTM) networks are crucial in identifying hate speech in textual data[56]. CNNs detect specific patterns and characteristics in the text using convolutional and pooling layers to extract important linguistic clues about hate speech. Meanwhile, (LSTM) models excel in comprehending the sequential structure of language, effectively capturing contextual interdependencies and enduring associations among words or phrases. By leveraging the capabilities of (CNNs) for extracting features and (LSTMs)[57], [58]. This collaboration allows for identifying hate speech content that is nuanced and embedded within its context. In [49],the study focuses on detecting hate speech diffusion on Twitter using graphbased methods. It finds that classification based on the sharing graph yields strong F1 scores for hate speech detection and highlights the vulnerability of existing textual hate speech detection methods to adversarial attacks. The study also considers the effects of automated bots in sharing hate speech content. The implications of the findings are relevant for addressing hate speech and online safety on social media platforms.[7]The DeepHate model utilizes multi-faceted text representations, including semantic, sentiment, and topical information, to improve hate speech detection. By combining pre-trained word embeddings, sentiment analysis, and Latent Dirichlet Allocation (LDA), the model achieves better performance compared to other configurations. Additionally, empirical studies provide insights into the salient features that aid in hate speech detection. [7] discusses the challenges of detecting hate speech in social media, particularly on platforms like Twitter. It explores deep learning approaches, such as various embeddings, to improve the detection of different types of hate speech. The experiments on publicly available datasets showed significant improvements in accuracy and F1-score, offering promising solutions to combat hate speech online. The authors [16] discussed cyberbullying detection using machine learning and deep learning approaches. Cyberbullying's potential dangers are highlighted, as are the benefits of effective detection methods. Methods for categorizing cyberbullying are



investigated in the research. The research examines machine learning and deep learning strategies for cyberbullying detection using two datasets: the Wikipedia Talk Corpus and the Twitter Hate Speech Corpus. The paper also addresses the role that technology plays in making cyberbullying more severe than in-person harassment. Overall, the research gives valuable insights into the detection of cyberbullying and the use of machine learning and deep learning technologies to solve this issue.[60] examines the challenges of detecting hate speech on social networking sites and the research in natural language processing (NLP) and machine learning (ML) to address this issue. The authors used an up-sampling method to balance the data. They implemented deep learning models like Long Short-Term Memory (LSTM) and Bidirectional Long Short-Term Memory (Bi-LSTM) for improved accuracy in detecting hate speech. LSTM was found to have better accuracy, precision, and F1 score, while Bi-LSTM had a higher recall. [61]Explores the problem of harmful language on social media platforms and suggests a technique for identifying it through the utilization of conventional machine learning models, as well as BERT and fastText embedding with deep neural networks. The authors merged the ALONE and HASOC'20 datasets to create a consolidated dataset for their research. The researchers pre-processed data and applied various machine learning and ensemble techniques, including TF-IDF, POS tagging, and trigrams. Among these approaches, LR and XGBoost yielded the most favorable results. In the second case, word embedding techniques such as fastText and BERT were employed to generate embeddings, which were subsequently utilized as inputs for DNN classifiers. The researchers used multiple deep neural network classifiers and found optimal performance was achieved by combining BERT embeddings with a convolutional neural network (CNN). [62] focused on hate speech detection methods using deep and shallow learning techniques. The study provides insights into the detection accuracy, computational efficiency, and practical implications of using pre-trained models and domain generalization. The paper presents a large-scale empirical evaluation of 14 shallow/deep classification-based hate speech detectors, evaluated on three large and publicly available hate speech detection benchmarks. [63] a study on detecting hate speech on Twitter using deep convolutional neural networks. The study uses machine learning-based classifiers such as Logistic Regression, Random Forest, Naive Bayes, Support Vector Machines, Decision Trees, and K-Nearest Neighbors to identify hate speech-related tweets on Twitter. The study also uses word embedding methods such as LSTM and Bi-LSTM models. The results show that the Deep Convolutional Neural Network architecture performs well in detecting hate speech on Twitter. Furthermore, in [54], the authors discussed detecting hate speech in social media using the LSTM algorithm. Results show that the capability to detect hate speech in online text automatically, high levels of accuracy, recall, and F1 score, and the potential to counteract hate speech on social media platforms are all features of this technology. In [55], BERT and Hate Speech Word Embedding with Deep Model detect hate speech in text

data. The paper describes feature and classifier approaches, reviews recent investigations, and includes datasets, embedding models, and experiment results. It successfully detects hate speech in English text data. [66]examines fuzzy categorization CNN-LSTM and Random Forest deep learning models. The research discusses Twitter hate speech detection issues and model efficacy. The discovery could be used in pattern recognition, machine learning, and AI beyond Twitter. [67] the research proposes an attentional multi-channel convolutional stacking Bidirectional LSTM network that uses word representation approaches to capture semantic relations at multiple windows. The model is compared to five state-of-the-art and five baseline models on three Twitter benchmark datasets. The presented model outperforms the others in most circumstances, and the absence of channels and attention mechanisms has the most significant influence, as proven in Figure 3. An online social network hate speech detection methodology can be utilized for data-driven cyber security.




Fig. 1 CNN+LSTM proposed model [67]

III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

Hate speech detection on social media is a big concern in machine learning [68], with numerous researchers actively addressing hate speech originating from various sources [29]. CNN is considered one of the most effective algorithms for detecting hate speech, as it utilizes several methodologies [69], algorithms, and techniques [70]. Table 1 of this research presents an overview of 15 studies focusing on detecting hate speech using (CNN) and (GRU) and Table 2 gives an overview of 15 studies focusing on detecting hate speech using (CNN) and (LSTM). Moreover, the reviewed papers have been updated and published within the last five years. The CNN-based models achieve an accuracy ranging from 90% and higher in eighteen of the thirty works of literature-each of the previous research papers utilized separate datasets comprising several Twitter comments. The findings indicate that the quantity and nature of datasets have minimal impact on the precision of CNN-based models. In the end, the review articles prove that machine learning models are also used for detecting hate speech texts. Still, the accuracy and reliability of deep learning models such as CNN, LSTM, and GRU are higher among other algorithms. Half the researchers found that models designed for a single dataset may make mistakes. Another gap is that the models cannot detect other languages because they are trained on English tweets only.

IV. CONCLUSION

The application of techniques for "deep learning" to identify hate speech on Twitter is an exciting strategy for reducing the negative impacts of cyberbullying. Since language on social media constantly changes, rule-based approaches could be more effective; however, deep learning models are ideally adapted to this challenge. These models employ natural language processing and deep neural networks to analyze hate speech, and they show promise in picking up on nuanced contextual differences and shifting patterns of intolerance. However, there are still obstacles to overcome, such as the requirement for extensive and varied labeled datasets, the possibility of

biased training data, and the persistent development of language and online communication. Fine-tuning algorithms to reduce false positives is also essential because it is difficult to compromise between suppressing hate speech and protecting free speech. Incorporating deep learning models into content moderation systems on platforms like Twitter can make the internet safer as technology and research in this area evolve. Researchers, platform developers, and communities must continue to work together to improve models, combat biases, and cultivate a more welcoming digital space. This research reviews fifteen studies on detecting hate speech on Twitter using deep learning methods. Different models and other datasets were used, and the results show us that CNN is the most accurate, reliable, and easier to detect comments and then classify as offensive, sexual, racist...etc.

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
